THE COOK'S CORNER

STRAWBERRY JAM
4 cups of large firm berries
2 cups of sugar and 1 1-3 cups corn syrup
Wash, hull and measure the strawberries. Place in a large bowl, add the sweetening (the sugar in layers) and let stand overnight. Heat slowly to boiling and cook about 20 minutes. Pour into a bowl and let stand overnight, then fill jelly glasses and seal. Makes 4 (6-ounce) glasses.

RASPBERRY CHERRY JAM
Cook two cups of pitted cherries in a small amount of water until the skins are tender. Add 2 cups of cleaned raspberries, 2 cups of sugar and 1 1-3 cups corn syrup. Boil the mixture until thick. Pour into sterilized glasses and seal. Makes about 5 (6-ounce) glasses.

PEAR AND APPLE JAM
Blend together 2 cups sliced pears 2 cups sliced apples, grate rind of one lemon, the juice of one lemon, 1 1-4 cups sugar and 2-3 cup corn syrup. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Boil rapidly until mixture is thick and clear. Pour into sterilized jars and seal. Makes about 5 pints of jam.

REAL CHANCE FOR HAPPINESS

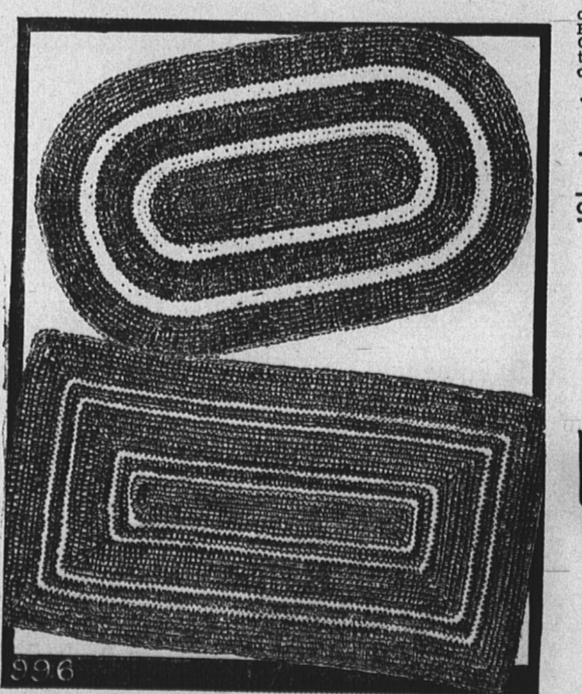

TO REMOVE STARCH
To remove starch or other foreign substances from the surface of your iron, try whitening. If it won't yield to this abrasive, try fine steel wool. Take care of your iron. Once the surface develops the tiniest rough spot, it is ruined for life work.

Mixed vegetables for soup or salad may be canned if the sterilization period is that of the vegetable requiring the longest time. For example if peas and carrots are canned for salad, the mixture must be given the long sterilization necessary for peas.

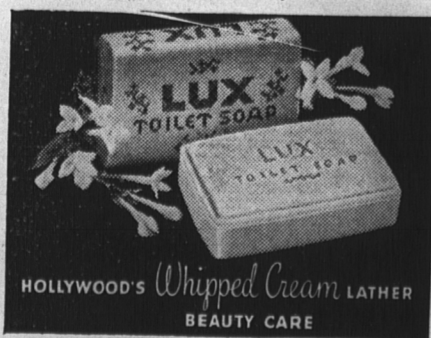
