—CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY—The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Management of the Children's Aid Society of Prince County was held in the Red Cross Room at the Town Hall on Tuesday evening. The President, Dr. J. A. MacPhee presided. A number of requests for clothing for children in the western part of the Province were received by the Society. As the Society is not a relief organization, but one for looking after delinquent children, these requests could not be granted. Four small boys were reported by the agent as having stolen a case of Ivory Soap from a citizen's garage, flashlight and bulbs and several other articles from the stores in the town during the business hours, being taken off counters in which the goods are displayed. These boys are around twelve years of age and are to be up before the Judge of the Juvenile Court in the course of a few days the informations having already been laid. It was also reported that these same boys charged with theft were stealing bottles of milk from doorsteps and breaking the bottles although they had no need of doing so as they have good homes. A case east of Summerside is being investigated of a child who is reported to be growing up without salutary parental control. S.

Produce is moving slowly at Summerside just now. A large quantity of poultry for the Christmas trade is being brought in. Prices quoted are not very high. Potatoes are practically at a standstill.

Turkeys are fetching 20c drawn and 15c undrawn; geese and ducks 12c drawn and 10c undrawn; chickens are 18c-20c drawn and 15c undrawn. Eggs, 22c, 24c, 25c.

Potatoes are 10c per bushel. Oats, feed, 37c; seed, 40c; barley and buckwheat, 50c; wheat, 75c; hay No. 1, \$14.00 a ton; straw, \$6.00; hides, 30 lb.; calf skins, 20c each; wool, washed, 15c; unwashed, 11c. S.
