THE overcrowded state of the Insane Hospital still continues. THOSE interested in ship building in this province will read the following with interest: Sailing ships have not, nor are they likely to, become obsolete, although the old-fashioned full rigged ship, that most beautiful of all human creations, may henceforth seldom be seen upon the ocean. Of late the ship-builders of the United States have been constructing huge seven masted schooners of enormous freight carrying capacity intended for long voyages. The advantages claimed for them are that they do not require so many men to work them, they cost much less than steam vessels to navigate, are easily handled and can be run at a profit greater than that of steamships. Seven vessels of this type are now under contract for construction and when ready for sea they will be the largest carrying craft afloat under sail and much larger than the ordinary class of freight steamships.

It is a rare treat to have talent such as this in our city and doubtless a large number will avail themselves of the opportunity to hear them.

THE price of coal is not likely to increase this year as it did last. Yet it must be remembered that the price has practically increased permanently. Merchants are now asking \$4.15 for some grades, round and as high as \$5.75 for hard. The prospects for the future are that the old prices will not return. The Mining Record of Stellarton, N. S., asserts that the Dominion Coal Company are about to test the feasibility of sending coal to the Mediterranean ports. The plan is two or three years old, but the unprecedented demand of the last two years has delayed matters. "Good gas coal, of which the Dominion Coal Company are large producers, is in much demand in France," says the Record. "While France produce some thirty million tons of coal, she is forced to import some twelve millions tons. It is thought our Cape Breton coal would find favor there as a gas producer and The Record will be in no way surprised to learn soon that arrangements have been entered into for the shipment of several large cargoes after the close of the St. Lawrence navigation."
