**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

POINTED SUGGESTIONS.

There are altogether too many whose power of discernment is limited and narrowed to that which is partisan. But the sympathies of Jesus and His thought of men ran wider. From tax-gatherer to pharisee, from harlot to princely dignity, He freely extended His ministry of discerning pity and love.

Possibly, to offer a condescending and patronizing hospitality is letter than to offer none at all—some good may come out of it. Whatever the mixture of motives was which induced Simon, the Pharisee, to invite Jesus to feast with him, it is evident that Jesus did not carp at the evil or unworthy in the mixture. He was too big for that. It is enough for Him that the door of opportunity was opened, and He entered.

Whether Simon felt as well pleased with himself after Jesus had dined with him as he, doubtless, felt before we do not know. The Master left him a good deal to think about. Courtesy takes on a larger meaning than pride can ever give it wherever Jesus has been.

Let the doctors of learning dispute as to which Mary, the harlot, who presented herself at the feet of Jesus in the house of Simon. They are not agreed. But their disputing does not affect the facts which are recorded and their thrilling and important lessons.

The motives of the woman in following Jesus into his house were doubted by the man who, with mixed motives, invited Him there. That is often the way—the more doubtful one's own motives are the lower the plane is which he gives to the motives of another.

And Simon had the temerity to think that his dignified courtesy forbade him to say, that Jesus ought to know that the woman at His feet was a prostitute, vile and reprobate—to be spurned and execrated, and that not discerning and knowing if He could not be a prophet. But Jesus proved His claim by revealing Simon to himself, rather than by the process of condemning the fallen. "Judge not, that ye be not judged." The one who supposes himself to be higher up than another has reason to fear God's judgments. There is none righteous, no, not one.

But Jesus was as tender with Simon as He was with Mary. How masterful was His argument with the pharisee; at the same time both subtle and straightforward. Let not the lesson slip any of us; if we think there is little in us which needs forgiveness we will love little.

Mary was penitent. And Jesus, who looks upon the heart, always meets the penitent with the fulness of compassion and defends the penitent one from the harsh, unwarranted and utterly un-Christian treatment that false standards and pharisaic pride would deal out.

A. B. Bruce says it well when he declares the action of Jesus towards Mary to have been "the action of an exceptionally holy Man and of a great imitator, the pure Lover of woman and the Redeemer from social indignity."

But that statement is only good as far as it goes. The teaching of the passage takes us further along than that. Those who sat at meat with Simon and Jesus got hold of something that it is for us to grip firmly when they said, "Who is this that even forgiveth sins?" Well, who?

A suggestive thing in this lesson to study out is this: How many Christian men and women today reflect the Christ-like in such a way as that the wicked and abandoned will be given to feel that there will be compassion and mercy and social lifting up in the spirit of the Master's forgiving love if they come to their meeting-place?

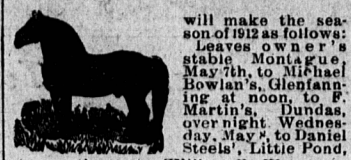

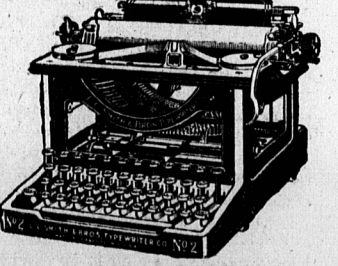
