OPERATING DOCTORS LOSE A PATIENT.

NEW YORK, March 13—An auto accident, in which one eye of a Street Cleaning Department driver was knocked out in Brooklyn yesterday afternoon, caused a great sensation in the Seney Hospital afterward, for Jeremiah O'Connor, the sufferer, escaped from the operating table of that institution and went to a hospital of his own selection.

O'Connor was walking beside his cart in Degraw Street, about four o'clock when an auto came along going toward Fourth Avenue. A projection at the machine's back struck O'Connor on the side of the head. He was knocked unconscious with his scalp cut and his right eye torn out.

He was taken to Seney Hospital unconscious and was laid on an operating table on the first floor. Then he was left alone until the doctors could prepare to operate. When they returned O'Connor had disappeared. He had got out of a window six feet above ground.

He went to his home at No. 203 Fifth Avenue, told his mother he had been hurt and walked to the Eye and Ear Hospital at No. 94 Livingston Street. There he was operated upon by Dr. Scott Wood. He may die.

NO DEVELOPMENTS IN BANK FAILURE.

ST. JOHN, March 12.—R. B. Kessen, general manager of the Bank of New Brunswick, arrived last night from St. Stephen, where he has been in connection with the suspension of the St. Stephen Bank. Seen by a Telegraph man last night, Mr. Kessen refused to discuss the bank's affairs. "I have nothing to say," was his reply to the reporter's question. "Did you know the St. Stephen Bank has decided to pay all deposits made on Saturday last?" queried the reporter.

"I am glad to hear it," was Mr. Kessen's reply. Other questions he would not discuss.

A telephone message from St. Stephen last evening contained the information that the bank would return all deposits placed in the bank on Saturday last, provided there were no claims against them.

Feeling in St. Stephen last evening was a little easier. While it was expected that a detailed examination of the bank's affairs would reveal a sorry condition, it was not anticipated there would be any more suspensions. The exact state of things cannot be learned until Mr. Kessen's report, presents his detailed report.

RABIES EPIDEMIC ALARMS ONTARIO.

TORONTO, March 12—Two clinics were held at the general hospital Saturday by Dr. C. A. Hodgetts, secretary of the provincial board of health, and Dr. J. A. Amyot, provincial bacteriologist, on cases which have suffered from acute contagion from rabies. They also administered Pasteur treatment to a patient at the hospital for sick children. Four additional patients entered the general hospital for treatment.

Following the clinics the physicians held a lengthy conference at the parliament building. The situation is becoming increasingly serious and additional co-operative steps may be taken with Dr. J. I. Rutherford, veterinary director-general, and the dominion authorities.

A startling large number of applications for provincial treatment are coming in from people who have suffered from contagion and the tests and examinations made indicate the serious character of the epidemic.

A post mortem examination was conducted on the body of the unfortunate boy who died from hydrophobia at Hamilton as a result of a dog's bite. Of its character and result the physicians are not prepared to at present speak, although it is understood the official report is in preparation. A report is also believed to be probable on some patients who have secured Pasteur treatment.

Dr. Amyot observed decidedly: "There is no room for doubt the situation is more serious than one likes to contemplate."

COUNTRY STARTLED BY GHASTLY STORY.

ST. JOHN, March 12—A ghastly story obtained great circulation over the eastern part of Canada yesterday. It was to the effect that the dismembered body of a murdered man had been found in a trunk at Harvey Station (N.B.) Newspapers in American cities heard of it, and one Boston paper wired their St. John correspondent to "rush the story at once."

As a matter of fact, the story arose in a simple, and at the same time, ludicrous fashion. A large trunk, containing slightly frozen meat, was placed on the station platform at Harvey Station. The meat thawed in the sun and a tiny trickle of blood oozed out of the trunk. Instantly there were reports of a gruesome tragedy, with the result that Harvey Station obtained more notoriety in a few hours than had ever fallen to its lot before.

TEMPERANCE PEOPLE ARE UP IN ARMS.

VICTORIA, B. C., March 13—The first session of the twelfth Parliament of British Columbia prorogued yesterday.

At the morning session several bills were killed. The Socialist leader had seven bills killed and the Government whip one. One bill proposed the extension of the eight hour day now in force in smelters to all employees brought in contact with smoke, fumes, dust or heat arising from smelting or refining operations. The Premier opposed it, contending that it was liable to drive out capital and close down smelters.

The temperance people are up in arms over the new liquor act, and it was admitted last night by the Premier and Attorney General that they saw a probability of the disallowance of the act, as it prevented the issue of licenses to Japanese. The act of 1899, which was disallowed, provided that the applicant must have two-thirds of the signatures of residents of the district. Chinese, Japanese and Indians excluded. The 1909 act requires the applicant to have two-thirds of the total number of householders of Caucasian race.

It was stated by the Premier that the act would be lived up to even if it were disallowed.

HALLY'S COMET WILL BE BRILLIANT SIGHT.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 13—Hally's comet may now be seen on nights when conditions are favorable, with the aid of an ordinary field glass. The most favorable time to look for it is between 6.30 and 7.30 p. m. with the glass elevated somewhat above where the sun sets. The Harvard observatory focused the wanderer nightly on their big telescope at Hamilton as some interesting photographs of its development are being made.

Professor E. C. Pickering, Director of the Harvard observatory, says: "The comet is at present in the twilight region. It is in the line of the sun and its brightness is dimmed by the lustre of the great centre of the solar system. Besides, it has not yet attained its maximum brilliancy. That will be May 18th. It will be visible all through April, but at its brightest in May. At about that time, if clouds do not obscure it, it will be a dazzling sight. About a third of the heavens will be colored with a fiery gold, its great flashes of light will play from one part of the heavens to another, and the sight will be remembered for generations. Hally's comet has been noted for its brilliant displays."
