James McLean was auctioneer and added much to the pleasure of the evening.

THE Colonial Herald of Sept. 19th, 1840 contains an announcement for the sale of all descriptions of live stock and Agricultural Produce to be held in a field near the residence of Samuel Lane, Lot 49 on Friday Oct 2nd of that year under the direction of the committee of the Independent Agricultural Society. On the same day a cattle and sheep show was to be held with prizes of £1 and 10s. and 15s. and 7s. for cows and sheep respectively. The judges were to be Charles Hazzard, Alexander McRae and Samuel Lane and J. R. Bourke was Secretary.

THE Maritime Provinces Amateur Athletic Association has issued a bulletin with the following caution: All persons are hereby warned that if this association has reasonable cause for suspicion against the amateur such person will be at once suspended and before being reinstated will be required by a sworn declaration to satisfy the association as to his amateur standing. All amateur athletes, and more especially those affiliated with this association, should assist in carrying out the rules by reporting all cases of a suspicious nature to the secretary. Particular attention is directed to the rule against the receipt of inducement by any amateur.

It is stated that water has been so scarce at Halifax that baths could not be had at the hotels; in many cases it was necessary to have water hauled in from outside the city, in order to supply the daily wants. This is the first occasion when there has been a shortage of water at Halifax. The Moncton reservoirs have always in reserve an immense supply of water, and at no time was there any indications of there being a shortage. An Intercolonial Railway official stated that the heavy rain of Wednesday afternoon and night might well be called "showers of blessings" for the I. C. R. people all along the line where the scarcity of water threatened much suffering and great inconvenience.—Moncton Transcript.
