Chapleau Old-Timer Has Key To Riches

William McLeod Holds Map for Gold Deposits Sought for a Century—Believes Fortune is Within Reach.

CHAPLEAU, Ont., May 21.—There lives in Chapleau today a man who believes he has a fortune within his grasp. He is William McLeod, one time "Sloop" for the Hudsons Bay Company, when for eight years he sailed the schooner "Mink" on regular supply trips between Ruperts House, Fort George and the Great Whale River.

Born in a Hudsons Bay Post, and still young in spite of his years, it is only with difficulty that Mr. McLeod can be brought to speak of his colorful career. He is known as extremely reticent. His quiet voice and pleasant manner give no hint that his life has not all been spent in the placid surroundings of a quiet northern Ontario town, and it somehow seems difficult to imagine him as master of a sailing schooner on the rough waters of James Bay.

The following year, word was received by the Indians that the explorer had died, and nothing more transpired until the year 1895 when a party of 10 headed by a man known to his Indian guides as "Corten" and a supposedly very wealthy man went into the region evidently armed with some sort of information.

Following Corten at a considerable interval, came one Osborne with three of a party. He also took Indian guides and went in on the same mission, but with equal result. Next came a party of Norwegians. Then Jones and a party of six. Jones made two trips in successive years but met with no better fortune. Curran of Montreal was next to try his luck in this area. On his first trip he took fourteen men and Indian guides, and returned to the scene twice later, each time without success.

"How did the Indian who gave you the map come into possession of it?" Mr. McLeod was asked.

"He was in one of the later parties as guide," he said, "and when they came out he was told by his friend that they had not gone to the right place, and this Indian had given him the map after pledging him to secrecy, as owing to advanced age there was no possibility of him making another trip in."

"After such a record of failures, do you believe the story?" Mr. McLeod was asked.

Apparently, there is no limit to the dramatic talent of charming Colleen Moore.

"Why Be Good?", which opened at the Prince Edward Theatre, is a comedy-drama, with equal emphasis on the humorous and serious qualities of the story. It is an up-to-the-minute picture, showing the modern American girl just as she is, her faults as well as her virtues being presented in an absorbing story that answers the question put forth in its title.

Certainly, the exuberant Colleen never before has had a story that capitalizes so profitably upon her delightful personality and dramatic talent. She makes decidedly real the character of little "Pett Kelly," wise-cracking, fast-stepping, pseudo-sophisticated and lovable. Splendid as she is in the comedy episodes, Miss Moore reaches the heights in strong scenes with her father, an ordinary parent who objects to the pace his daughter is setting. It is a family battle often repeated in real life, and your sympathy for the arguments of the father is diluted by an understanding of the nineteen-year-old girl's side of the question. "Why Be Good?" is essentially a very human and reasonable story.

No need for anyone to have a disgruntled outlook on life, Charlie Murray in "Do Your Duty" at the Capitol Theatre, will see to that. If he doesn't keep you laughing no one can.

First National Pictures has never offered a more human nor more entertaining comedy. From the start of the picture till its conclusion there is no cessation of fun or dramatic thrill, as for instance, when the respectable Charlie and his Scotch friend, played by Lucien Littlefield, are locked in a vault in a jewelry store and succeed in capturing a gang of crooks.

Murray, always to be depended upon for providing plenty of merriment, is at his best as a cop. Years ago he made the Keystone cop famous. Today he is a more refined version of the peace officer but just as funny.

Doris Dawson, as ingenue lead, is charming. She is Murray's daughter, and is to marry a young policeman played by Charlie Delaney. The wedding is in a pollockation and is almost disrupted because Murray fails to show up. But he gets there at the finish, having redeemed himself by capturing the crooks who had framed him earlier in the story.

Charlie McHugh and Ed Brady are a couple of thieves in the story and do a good job of it, while pretty Yola d'Avril is their accomplice. Some clever kiddies help out the fun in the home scenes.
