..*ST COLUMBA.—The new church of St. Columba, East Point, is now entirely completed exteriorly, and is being used for divine service. The interior finish is yet to be done, but for all intents and purposes the church is complete for the use of the parish. It is a great piece of work, and reflects the highest praise on the worthy pastor in charge of this gigantic work, Rev. Father Ronald MacDonald. What is more, there is no outside debts on the building, what money is owing is borrowed from the wealthy parishioners at the low sum of 4 per cent. Father MacDonald, and the elders are undecided whether they will put in a furnace to heat the church, this winter or not. The poor crops this year and the low prices to the farmers and fishermen who comprise the congregation, cause them to hesitate about making so large an expenditure in a fall like this, and they may use the parish hall for service this winter again. The new church which is of solid brick and concrete accommodates one thousand persons comfortably, besides a commodious sacristy. The altar fund, for the main altar, has already reached the sum of \$1,450. Besides church-building Father Ronney is preparing to repair parish buildings which have this far been somewhat neglected and to that end has planned to get a lot of lumber out this coming winter. On the parish farm is a growth of softwood lumber. The farm is three miles long, probably the longest farm on the island, as is also that of the adjoining farms of Jos McInnis, Wm. Campbell, Chester McNeill. All of last week the Provincial land surveyor was engaged running out these long lines preparatory to sending a gang of men into the woods to chop.

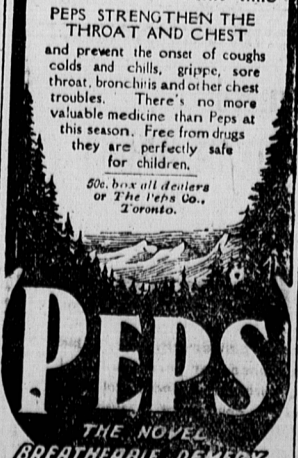
