REORGANISATION OF MILITARY STAFF

Under An Imperial Officer to be Appointed Director General of Operations— Will be Six Directors General of Various Services — Personnel of the Staff— Military Store in St. John Robbed.

MANY MILITARY DIRECTORS.

OTTAWA, Dec. 2.—(Special).—An Imperial officer is to be brought out to assume the position of Director-General of Operations and Staff Duties, a new office which is to be created.

There will be a Director-General of Intelligence and Colonel Evans of Winnipeg will be given this position.

Colonel Biggar will be Director-General of Transports and Major Pinet will be Deputy Adjutant-General.

The Medical Service will have a Director-General in person of Colonel Pinet and Colonel Donaldson will be Director-General of Clothing and Equipment.

Colonel Rutherford will be Director-General of Artillery and Colonel Weatherbee Director-General of Engineers.

ADMIRAL DAVIS NORTH SEA JUDGE

President Appoints Member of Commission on Trawler Case Instead of Dewey, Who Declined.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 1.—The President to day announced that he had selected Rear Admiral Charles H. Davis of the Navy to serve as a member of the International Commission which is to settle the controversy growing out of the Russian onslaught upon the British fishing vessels off Hull recently. Admiral Davis will serve instead of Admiral Dewey, who declined the appointment. Admiral Davis will not be offered the inconvenience of serving as chairman of the commission, a post which on account of his high rank would have been forced upon Admiral Dewey had the latter accepted the position. The American government, therefore, is satisfied with such representation as provided by the appointee of the day, because, while serving simply as an ordinary member of the commission, Admiral Davis will not be called upon to render action which will make him an especial object of criticism should any of the decisions be of a character exciting comment. The British and Russian Governments have been notified of Admiral Davis' appointment.

EARL GREY IS NOW ON HIS WAY

LONDON, Dec. 1.—Earl Grey, who succeeds the Earl of Minto as Governor-General of Canada, started this morning for his post, accompanied by the Countess, their two daughters and two aides de camp. Among the many persons who gathered to bid them farewell at the Railroad Station were Foreign Secretary Lansdowne; the Earl and Countess of Minto, Lord Stratford and Mount Royal, the Canadian High Commissioner; the Duke of Abercorn, Colonial Secretary Lytton and the American Charge de Affairs, H. White. The travellers will embark on the Allan line steamer Parisian after an official reception by the lord mayor of Liverpool.

LOTT MAY RETURN TO GIVE EVIDENCE

In Letter to Belleville He Asks for Assistance, and Says He is Heartbroken.

STIRLING, ONT., December 1.—A letter from BYRON O. Lott was received in this town yesterday by a prominent citizen. It bore the postmark of Syracuse, N. Y., and was evidently mailed there. Its contents lead one to believe that Lott intends to return to Belleville at an early date and give evidence in the bogus ballot-box conspiracy case. He asks for assistance, and craves the good offices of his friends in his behalf in the present and approaching trials. He says he is heartbroken and anxious to return. He also mentions his wife, and wishes the recipient of the letter to comfort and reassure her.

MEREDITH FOR TORY CABINET

Whitney Was Asked if He Would Take the Judge and and Ross Robertson into His Cabinet.

TORONTO, Dec. 1.—The News says tonight: "Prominent Conservatives are said to be quietly arranging a Cabinet slate for Mr. Whitney, with the expectation that the Conservative Party will be returned to power as a result of the approaching general election. In this connection there is an interesting report, that on the night of Nov. 23, a deputation of Conservatives waited on Mr. Whitney at the Queen's Hotel and asked him if he would be willing to take into his Cabinet, Sir William Meredith and John Ross Robertson and give them leading portfolios. It is said that the Conservative leader promised consideration and repeated the answer next day when the deputation approached him a second time. The deputation was inspired by a laudable desire to assist Mr. Whitney in strengthening his prospective Government."

MORE EXPOSURES IN BELLEVILLE, ONT.

It Will Shortly Be Attempted to Prove That Vance, Liberal Organizer-in-Chief, Was in Direct Communication Before the Election With Shibley, the Missing Member-Elect for Frontenac.

BELLEVILLE, December 1.—Hon. West Hastings. The second disclosure to be made on Friday next is even more startling. This will be no less than positive proof that Vance, the liberal organizer-in-chief, with headquarters in Toronto, was in direct communication for some time preceding the election with Shibley, the late liberal candidate in Frontenac, whose whereabouts are also unknown. The prosecution will prove that a meeting took place in Kensington between Shibley and Vance. The disclosure, it is alleged, will also implicate a well known politician of Brantford. The prosecution will show that Vance, the Liberal organizer was in telegraphic communication with Shibley during the time when the plot to switch the ballots was consummated. The last telegraph message bore the date of November 1st, three days before the election.

RENNEKAMPFF'S BOLD VENTURE

Puzzling Situation. St. Petersburg, Dec. 2.—(Special).—The situation of the armies below Mukden again attracts attention, though the movements are puzzling.

Despatches indicate that the Japanese army has been chilled by the very cold weather, as they have not been showing their old spirit.

The general opinion is that the present situation is not to last much longer, and a suspension exists that Oyama is trying work around to the eastward, with a view to striking the Russians above the Pass.

MAY BE A TRAP. General Rennenkampff is hotly following Japs' retreat and has met with much success but the fear is expressed that he may be running into a Japanese trap and it is not believed that he can hold a position so far south as the Taitsie River.
