STOCK QUOTATIONS

Base Metals Sells Montreal Stock Dull Trading At New High Exchange On Montreal Exchange

TORONTO, Oct. 12 (CP)—Base metal stocks sold at a new high for the year on the Toronto exchange today and the golds were at their highest in more than a month. All index groups posted gains, the base metals and the industrials adding .89 and .78 respectively and the golds and western oils 39 each. Volume was the heaviest in a week with 836,000 shares changing hands.

Followers of the industrial board were inclined to go easy, possibly because of the holiday on the New York market where Columbus day was observed. Good stocks posted gains, steels were off moderately and the papers, banks and senior oils and liquor stocks were firm. Noranda registered a new high for the year at 79 1/2 and the close was unchanged at 79 while Smelters gained 2 points to 62 1/2 and Hudson Bay and International Nickel added minor fractions. The cheaper base metals posted modest gains. Falconbridge firm- ed 10 cents. Sherritt 5. Pend Oreille 6 and Coast Copper 25. Eldorado tumbled the silvers, gaining 12 cents on good volume. Turnover of 134,000 shares was registered by Bobo and the price closed 3 cents higher on the news that drilling had started on the woman river district holdings. Agate was another penny feature, up 2 1/2 on a trade of 71,000 shares.

Senior golds moved quietly at changes of only minor fractions and the close was down a few cents for East Malartic. Kerr-Addison, Little Long Lac, O'Brien and On. Plata. Macassa advanced 25 cents. The trade in the western oils broadened out and a few issues traded in volume at better prices.

GRAIN

WINNIPEG, Oct. 12 (CP)—Winnipeg wheat futures made slow headway late today with operations virtually at a standstill due to lack of outside influences. Prices rallied at the start and then eased to close 1-8-3-8 higher, Oct 6-18, Nov 6-3-8, Dec 5-3-4, May 63 1-4-8.

After the initial buying flurry by local commission houses and seaboard firms, trading halted for long periods. Offerings were light and contributed to the strong undertone of the market.

With United States markets on holiday all intermarket operations were at a standstill. Buenos Aires also was closed.

Reports of dry weather which may have a serious effect on the Australian wheat crop caused improved buying at Liverpool, and resulted in final quotations 1 3/4-7-8 higher.

Cash wheat demand continued slow. Spreads were unchanged. Exporters and Millers sought oats and barley in the cash pit but sales were registered due to light offerings.

Course grain futures leaned upward. Appearance of tightness in the October positions gave prices firmness. The day's volume was small.

LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, Oct. 12 (CP)—Montreal live stock markets receipts today were cattle, 50 calves, 40 hogs and 240 sheep and lambs. Good steers made \$5.50 to \$6 with medium kinds around \$5.00. Fat breedy western cows made \$4.60 to \$4.75. Plain kinds of cattle sold at \$2.50 to \$4.25 for cows, with canners and cullets at \$2.75 to \$3.25.

Lambs were steady at \$7-75 for ewes and wethers, \$6.75 for heavy lambs, and \$5.75 for culls and bucks.

Sheep were \$2.00 to \$3.50. The few hogs offered brought \$9.00 for bacon of trucks. Sows were \$7.00 to \$7.50.

On the Maritime markets rail grade hogs declined 20 cents to \$11.25. Sows remained steady at \$8 dressed weight. Live hogs were 15 cents lower at \$9.50 for bacon off trucks, with sows steady at \$5.75 of trucks.

Cattle were lower. Good steers made \$6.25 medium \$5.25, fair \$4.25, and common \$2.50 to \$3.75. Butcher cows ranged from \$2-25 to \$3.50. Canners and cullets were from \$1.50 to \$2.25. Bulls were \$2.50 to \$3.

Lambs and calves were steady. Good lambs sold up to \$7. Grass calves \$3 to \$4 with veal calves from \$4 to \$7.50.

Japanese Push Towards Yangsin

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) SHANGHAI, Oct. 11—Japanese military officials tonight reported that a minor movement against Yangsin had forced a Chinese withdrawal from that bulwark of Hankow's outlying defences, about 80 miles southeast of the Chinese military capital.

They said the fall of Yangsin was appreciably nearer and foresaw a quick cutting of the Canton-Hankow railway south of Hankow. Yangsin is about 90 miles east of Sienning, a railway town about 50 miles from Hankow.

Artillery thundered across the Yangtze Valley as the Japanese sought control of hills before Yangsin. Beyond Yangsin lay stretch of level ground across which the Japanese hoped to thrust to the vital railway.
