A VISITOR'S IMPRESSION.—A Shediac correspondent to the Amherst News says: "The important seed potato growing industry of Prince Edward Island has been hard hit by blight due to heavy rains and humid weather, and in many districts farmers fear that the tubers will not pass inspection. Robert Jardine, of Shediac, formerly of Saint John, who has just completed a 152 mile drive through the Island province, says that many farmers have received a severe setback. At this time it is difficult to estimate the size of the potato crop which will be marketable for consumption, but it is known that the exports for seed purposes to the United States will be heavily reduced. Grain crops on P. E. Island have also been seriously affected by wet and windy weather."

Death Discloses Author's Identity

(Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—The recent death of Countess Cunliffe-Owen brought from a member of the household the disclosure that she was the author of the book, "The Martyrdom of an Empress," a biography of Empress Elizabeth of Austria, published anonymously in 1899 a year after the assassination of the Empress by an anarchist in Geneva.

The book attracted wide attention on both sides of the Atlantic, for it contained, an extraordinarily dramatic version of the "Tragedy of Mayerling," the mysterious death of the Austrian Crown Prince Rudolph and the beautiful Marie Vetsera, whom he loved, in his hunting lodge in January 1889. It was said that the Countess learned the true story from Empress Elizabeth.

Born in Brittany, the Countess married the late Frederick Cun-

liffe-Owen, a younger son of Sir Francis Cunliffe-Owen. They came to the United States in 1885, on a secret diplomatic mission, it was said, and while here their joint fortune was swept away in Europe.

Both began writing. Mr. Cunliffe-Owen served as foreign editor on two New York newspapers and wrote features based on his knowledge of European conditions and personalities. The Countess published a series of biographies, among them the lives of Franz Josef and Kaiser Wilhelm II. These and her novels were published anonymously under the name "The Author of the Martyrdom of an Empress."
