Of course the result will not be known for some time but at last accounts the young lady was resting comfortably. Mr. Fielding would leave Vienna as soon as it was safe to do so. Mrs. Fielding and Miss Zillah will not return immediately, but will probably remain four or five months at Vienna or elsewhere in Europe.

AMONG those at Cape Traverse during the last storm were A. Jodidou, who belongs to the western part of the Island and had been called home by the death of his father which took place three weeks ago. Mr. Jodidou lives in Pawtucket, R. I. and his trip cost over \$50 before he reached Summerside. Another of those storm-stayed was Thomas Doyle, Springfield, Mass. Mr. Doyle who is 78 years of age walked from Cape Traverse to Summerside to await a train to Charlottetown where he is coming on a business trip.

The new Liberal paper for St. John's is issued in about a month. C. J. Milligan, formerly of The Telegraph, will be its manager. It will be printed at the Globe office until its own plant, and building will be in readiness. Just who is to edit the paper is not generally known. John Lewis of the Toronto News is mentioned as a likely man. For some time he was with the Globe and later with the World before going to the Williston-Flavelle organ.
