Ledwell, physician who attended the deceased the hearing adjourned until word is received back from an autopsy performed on the body of the deceased.

Mr. James W. McCallum is foreman of the jury comprised of Messrs. Thomas White, L. A. McDonald, G. S. Williams, Milton Bell, Frank Wheatley and Forest Stocome.

On being sworn in Dr. Ledwell stated that he had received a call to go to the home of the deceased on Euston Street around 9 o'clock Monday night. On arriving there he found the man in bed lying in a coma and vomiting. Witness had the deceased removed to the City Hospital for treatment where he gave him treatment for coma but the man passed away about an hour after being admitted.

12 Canuck fliers On R.A.F. list Of casualties

LONDON, Aug. 26 - (CP Cable) - Twelve Canadian airmen, eight of them from western Canada, were included in the Royal Air Force's 78th casualty list issued tonight which contains 494 names. Listed among the Canadians as missing was Flying Officer Cecil Victor Fraser of Claresholm, Alta., who was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross last November 1940, for "general good work." Island fish Catch down; Value higher

HALIFAX, Aug. 26 - (CP) - An increase of 2,732,600 lbs. in the amount of fish caught in the Maritime Provinces in July as compared with the catch for the same month of 1940 was reported today by the eastern division of the Department of Fisheries. The increase in the landed value was \$326,631. The catch in the division totalled 78,507,800 lbs. with a landed value of \$1,277,600 compared with the landings of 75,775,000 lbs. valued at \$950,977 for the same month of last year.

In Nova Scotia the catch decreased by 3,068,300 lbs., but the landed value was \$146,973 greater. The report said there was no loss of life during July but that loss of property amounted to about \$5,500. Total quantity of fish landed was 49,995,600 lbs., with a value of \$866,468.

In New Brunswick both catch and value were greater than in July, 1940, the catch by 4,646,600 lbs. and the value by \$117,142. The sardine fishery showed the greatest increase, a jump of 8,221,700 lbs., in weight and \$74,004 in value. The report said 21,616,700 lbs.
