A lecture on the Fox Industry was given by Mr. Albert Lemuel Squier, in Esther Hall, Pratt Bldg., before an attentive audience of over 200 people on the occasion of the opening of the Hub Fox and Fur Exchange, of which Mr. John O. Ammann is Secretary Treasurer.

After the lecture, which was illustrated by a series of beautiful picture slides from photographs taken by Mr. Squier personally on his visit to P. E. I. last summer, a history of the industry was given by Mr. B. I. Rayner of Alberton, P. E. I., President of the Rayner Silver Black Fur Co., Ltd., of Summerside, under whose auspices the lecture was given. Remarks were also made by Mr. Herbert W. Ramsay, Business Manager of The Hub Fox & Fur Exchange of Truro, N.S. Mr. Ramsay had very kindly and enterprisingly sent forward by Express from the Moorehead P. E. I. Ranch of Central Lot 16, P. E. I., (Roy E. McLean, Rancher) a pair of Silver Black Foxes. But unfortunately the Foxes were held up at Summerside owing to the delay in securing the necessary permit from the Agricultural department at Washington to enter the foxes. The foxes at this writing are on the way to Malden from Summerside and due to arrive in Malden tomorrow Sunday Oct. 11th. The foxes will be exhibited in the show window of the Malden for a few days and then be returned to the Moorehead Ranch at Central Lot 16.

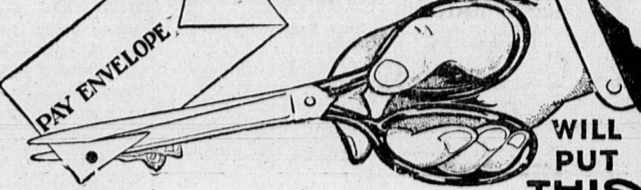
