RANGERS WIN CLOSE TILT FROM CRYSTALS 7-6

Worth Performs Hat Trick As Teams Stage Speedy And Keenly Played Game

The hockey season was officially opened, in Summerside last night when the Charlottetown Rangers nipped a close win over the Summerside Crystals. Both teams showed fine form in their initial encounter. The game was nip and tuck all the way and played at a burning clip throughout. Play was very even with the Rangers making the most of their breaks.

Several new faces appeared on each team and from the encounter it looks like a toss up as to which squad will carry off the Island senior title. The game was very clean with Earl Arsenault making a fine job with the whistle. Manager Harold Gaudet has the rink in good shape with a perfect sheet of ice.

The game was officially started by Mayor Campbell and Mr. Marble. The Crystals jumped into an early lead when after 40 seconds of play Hogan raced in to feed Schurman a goalmouth pass that the latter made no mistake in sinking. The Rangers attacks lacked force and were mostly broken up at the Summerside blue line. At 3:25 Jay evaded the count from a mixup in front of the Crystal cage when he scooped in a loose puck. The black and white squad continued to hold the edge and a few minutes later McGinnis made a fine save when Chick Gallant broke into the open to test him with a hard drive. Charlottetown began to get their ice legs and by the close of the period were taking a more equal share of the puck carrying. Play roughened slightly as both defences began to throw their weight around. In the dying minutes of the frame Walter Arsenault missed a great chance to give the Crystals the lead when his uncovered shot grazed the top cording of the open net. The period ended one all.

Rangers Open Drive
The Rangers took the jump on the play in the opening minutes of the second period and the Crystals up behind their blue line after 45 seconds of wild scrambling. Worth sank Jay's rebound to put the Rangers in the lead. But at 2:10 Chick Gallant hit one of his famous solo jaunts to tie the red light on a long hard drive. The Crystals went back into the lead at 3:05 when Hogan scored on an assist from Cahill, play seessawed as the second half of the puck carrying. The Rangers tied it up again when Worth beat Casey in a play that saw Whelan and Jay handle the disc. Worth again tallied at 3:30 to put the Charlottetown crew out in front. McClintock increased the lead when he took Cudmore's rebound to beat Casey from close in. Steele whittled the lead at 3:55 with a goal that saw Cahill and Dickie assist. The period ended 5-4 for the Rangers.

Set Fast Clip
The final frame opened fast with both teams turning on the heat. After 35 seconds of play Whelan started the scoring when he sagged the twines on a double pass from Worth and Jay. A minute later Brimble, fast skating new addition of the Crystals, broke the scoring column when he stick-handled close before blasting one past McGinnis. A few minutes later the Crystals started a line change after a whistle but the referee did not see it and started the play. Chick Gallant raced in to take out a goal but when the smoke lifted the extra players had not gotten off the ice and the play was disallowed. The play remained fast with the game a bit ragged in spots. Whelan again flashed the red light on a pass from Worth at 14:50. The Crystals came right back when A. Hogan to Schurman to Gallant pass put Cahill and Dickie in the open. The old warhorse raced in from his right wing to pull the goalie and then poked the puck into the open corner to end the scoring. The only penalty of the game came as a result of the too many men on the ice incident.
