She leaves to mourn, a sorrowing mother and the following brothers and sisters, Elvira and Clifford at home, Beattie, Mrs. Dr. Brigham, and Bert in the United States.

Last evening a public Temperance meeting was held in the school house at Burnt Church, N. B., under the auspices of the Sons of Temperance. The speaker was Rev. R. H. Stavert, Grand Worthy Patriarch of the Sons of Temperance. This is the second time the owners of the fast P. E. I. pacer have been disappointed. However, lovers of light harness racing are likely to see Meadowvale in action on race, and a meet between him and Molly J., the American mare imported last summer by W. Conagher, of Sydney Mines, has been arranged. The date of the meeting is fixed for Wednesday afternoon, March 27, and will likely take place on the harbor ice near the site of the new government wharf in Ward 1. The race is for \$100.00, half mile heats, best three in five.—(Meadowvale was formerly owned by J. A. Henderson, Charlottetown.)

In the death of Simon Bolger, the well known proprietor of the Osborne House, Charlottetown, lost a familiar figure and an intelligent citizen. He had been ill for several years from cancer, but was able to attend to his hotel duties until over two months ago. He was born in Kilkenny, Ireland, in May 1838. He came out to this country, when a lad of thirteen, locating first in Charlottetown, where he learned the tanning business. He subsequently removed to St. Peter's Bay, where he conducted a tannery and large general store for a number of years. He was elected in the Conservative interests as a member of the Legislative Council for the St. Peter's and Souris District. He served his district faithfully and energetically whilst in the then Upper House. He took an active interest in public affairs, and was a strong advocate of everything tending to promote the agricultural welfare of the people. In 1882 he came to Charlottetown where he had been engaged in the hotel business, being proprietor of the Rankin House and later the Osborne. Mr. Bolger was an ardent Home Ruler, and always had a warm place in his heart for his native land. He was for many years an enthusiastic member of the Benevolent Irish Society, and at one time held the office of President. Mr. Bolger was thrice married, his last wife being a native of Georgetown, nee Miss Bridget Hessian, who survives him. She is a sister of Michael and Thomas Hessian of that town. He leaves also to mourn, three sons in Chicago, John, Simon and Paul, two in Boston, Joseph and Daniel, one daughter, Lizzie, in Boston, and another daughter Georgina in California.
