Walter Pickard's Rink To Represent Local Club In Curling Competition

Chalking up three victories out of four in a gruelling marathon day of play Walter Pickard's Beginners rink Saturday night captured the Regal Flour Curling Club competition by defeating W. R. Corning's Little Four rink in the final after five teams had finished the regular schedule of games deadlocked for top position. The victory qualified the Pickard rink to compete against rinks from Montague and Summerside at the local rink for the trophy emblematic of the Island championship in this competition.

Score of the final game was 14 to 6 as the two rinks displayed some of the finest curling and shot-making this season. Just barely squeezing into the playoff with an afternoon victory over the Dreadnaughts after being defeated by the Little Four in their opening match of the day the new club champions after drawing the bye in the first round, came through with two clean cut victories over the Legion and Little Four to win their victory.

On the first end of the final match Pickard's rink lay in for four; Corning raked to chalk up a three on the second and then square the match with a single on the third. Pickard however came back with two doubles on the next two ends to regain his lead, added to it on the fifth and then after the Aces had chalked up singles on the seventh and eighth, the winners cut Little Four out of a possible three with their last shot on the ninth end and sewed up the title by outcurling the Legion for a three on the tenth and final end.

Members of the winning rink are: Skip, Walter Pickard; mate, Roy Quigley; second, Roy Bevan; first, stone, Walter Mathieson.

In the first match of the day, all encounters being held in conjunction with the Regal Flour Bouspiel prizes donated by Carvell Bros., Little Four made it a four cornered tie by downing the Beginners 12 to 5. In a match that had no bearing on the standing Marines wound up their schedule with a 7-5 victory over the Juniors and then Beginners made it a five way tie by edging out Ed. Tanton's Dreadnaughts 10-8 on the last end of the match.

Starting the final playoff, a straight knockout affair, Art McPherson's Perfection rink, league leaders right up to the final day were knocked out of the running as Little Four, losing only two ends, won 14-4.

4:30 Club and Legion other teams figuring in the tie staged the best match of the play off when Fred Nash's rink the Legion beat Ben Conrad's team 10-8 on an extra end after the rinks had finished ten ends deadlocked at 8-all. And it was only a perfect shot by Skip Nash that sent his team into the second round. With 4:30 Club laying in for shot on a Legion having number two stones, Nash with hardy men to spare took a well-earned return to come through the first end and knock the shot out to lay two for the match. It was the equal of any shot seen at the Curling rink this season.

Legion however fell before the Beginners 16 to 3 in the next match as the Pickard team displaying the same form that carried them to the title lost but two ends to the Legion on the first end and ending up with the same number on the tenth.

Dominion Curlers Are Poised For Opening Of Championship Play

WINNIPEG, March 3—(CP)—Forty of Canada's best curlers are poised here for the opening tomorrow of the four-day Macdonald's Brier Bowl, 14th annual championship event of the roarin' game in this Dominion. Leading the 10 competing rinks, representing all provinces with two from Ontario, is the Bert Hall quartet from Kitchener, Ont., playing in the Brier for a third consecutive year and defending the Tankard the rink won last year in Toronto.

Never before has the Brier been held outside Toronto. When the invitation of the Manitoba Curling Association was accepted last year it was considered the forerunner of a new era in Brier play—with the classic to be played in every province eventually.

Further indication of this possibility is the invitation of the Quebec Curlers' Association incorporated to stage the 1942 championship in Quebec City. The invitation will be considered this week by the Brier trustees.

Rangers Better Chances By Win Over Hawks

CHICAGO, March 3—(AP)—New York Rangers enhanced their chances of winning first place honors in the National Hockey League with a 2-1 victory over Chicago Black Hawks tonight before a crowd of 18,114, the highest stadium turnout of the season.

The Hawks, although crippled by the absence of three players, took a one-goal lead in the second period when Earl Selbert grabbed a loose puck and fired it past Dave Kerr.

Chicago's lead, however, was short lived. Less than eight minutes later Kirby MacDonald made a goal under similar circumstances to tie the score. There the matter stood until the 10th minutes of the final period when Dutch Hiller scored from far out after a difficult angle. This was the payoff shot and the Rangers dominated the play thereafter.

The victory was the Rangers' first in four games with the Hawks and gave a three-point lead over Boston in the first place fight. The defeat left the Hawks in fourth place, six points back of the third-place Toronto Maple and eight points ahead of the fifth-place Detroit Red Wings.

NEW YORK, March 3—(AP)—Hitting a new low in the futility of their attack, Montreal Canadiens took a 3-0 whitewashing from the Americans tonight and were left with only the slimmest chances of overhauling the New Yorkers for the last berth in the National Hockey League playoffs.

The victory, giving the Americans three of a possible four points in their weekend double bill against Canadiens, left the New Yorkers seven points ahead with five games to play.

After a scoreless opening period Murray Armstrong scored what proved to be the winning goal after 14 minutes play in the second, converting a rebound of Buzz Boll's shot. Just to make matters sure, Tommy Anderson and Hooley Smith counted in the third period.

Earl Roberts' n enjoyed his easiest night of the season in registering his sixth shutout. The Canadiens were close, not more than three times and Robertson didn't have a dozen shots to handle.

Royals Earn Draw With Strong Navy Squad In Game At Forum Saturday Night

A third period counter from the stick of Pud Roach early in the session Saturday night gave Junior Royals a 3-all draw with the Navy team in the fourth game of the playoffs for the Commercial-Service Hockey League title and left the Royals still in possession of the only victory so far in the series with Saturday's game being the third draw in succession the teams have figured in.

Both teams checked closely as the first period got underway with McLeod being scooped at the goalmouth by McInnis, Sparked by the presence on their lineup of "Snag" Squarebriggs centering the second end and Doug Saunders behind the blueline Navy had five in route mark started to display an edge over the Juniors and Boates had to be good on three occasions to keep his cage clear.
