### RAILROADS MOST DANGEROUS

The most dangerous occupation is generally supposed to be that of a sailor on a merchant vessel. From statistics of 1899, however, Lord James has found that among the shunters on the British railroads 458 were killed and 478 were injured, while in the merchant marine 62 were killed, with very few non-fatal accidents. In coal mines 1,287 persons were killed in the non-textile trades, and 2,212 in the textile factories. The most dangerous trade is that of the miner without government protection.
