(By The Canadian Press) OTTAWA, April 29—Repeated and thunderous desk-pounding tonight studded Finance Minister Abbott's budget as he read out the portion announcing an average of 29 per cent reduction in income tax.

Some members promptly took out pencils and paper and started working out the effects on themselves.

Apparently enjoying himself, the former Montreal corporation lawyer grinned several times as the noise of pounding hands—traditional Commons' method for expressing approval—welled up on both sides of the House. Prime Minister King smiled up at him as he read the 26-page fiscal survey.

**Canada Forced To Dip Into Gold Reserves**

(By The Canadian Press) OTTAWA, April 28—Canada had to bite into her gold and United States dollar reserves to the extent of \$263,000,000 in 1946 because of an all-time high current account deficit in trade transactions with the United States, Graham F. Towers, chairman of the Foreign Exchange Control Board, said today in his annual report tabled in the Commons by Finance Minister Abbott.

Although Canada still had a reserve of \$1,244,500,000 in gold and U. S. dollar reserves at the end of 1946, Mr. Towers said "it is clear that in the long run we shall have either to reduce our deficit with the United States by selling more to, or spending less in that country or to increase our United States dollar income from other countries."

The current account deficit in transactions with the United States during the year totalled \$603,000,000. However, \$237,000,000 of this deficit was covered by gold and United States dollars received in transactions with other countries. Inflows of capital to Canada produced an additional \$103,000,000, leaving \$263,000,000 as the amount which it was necessary to take out of reserves. While Canada had a deficit in trade with the United States she had a surplus with the sterling

area and with countries other than the United States and the sterling area.

"Taking the world as a whole, we had a net favorable balance on current account of \$488,000,000," said Mr. Towers. However, much of this trade was financed through credits to the United Kingdom and other countries.

Canada had a current account surplus in trade with the sterling area in 1946 of more than \$650,000,000, much of it financed by net credits and advanced by Canada to the United Kingdom.

Transactions with countries other than the United States and the sterling area showed a balance in Canada's favor of about \$400,000,000. Approximately \$100,000,000 of this amount represented relief and no payment was received. A total of \$210,000,000 was financed by Canadian export credits and the balance of \$90,000,000 was paid by the countries concerned in United States dollars.
