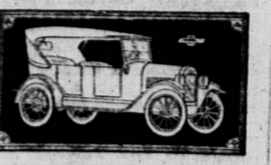

DOES YOUR MOTOR PUMP OIL?

"What can be done for a motor that pumps oil?" That question is asked hundreds of times a year by troubled and annoyed motorists, who hardly rejoice in the frequent cleaning of plugs. Some try new rings, some special rings baffle plates, different oil, different gas, dope for gasoline, and an hundred other believed remedies for this trouble. Many have cured the disease, others have failed.

Many will perhaps be surprised to know that personally, I have found seventy percent of oil pumping troubles due to the combining of wrongs of oil and valves. I have cured many oil pumpers by simply grinding the valves. This remedy is perfectly logical when one considers that imperfect combustion must allow a quantity of oil that might be pumped into the combustion chamber to remain there. It is hard enough to explode gasoline when not properly compressed. What must it mean then if oil is present?

An oil pumper does no material damage except for producing carbon, if the oil is consumed by the explosion. A popular sleeve valve motor consumes oil at all times to a greater extent than a poppet valve motor, but it is claimed to be extremely easy on oil owing to the fact that it cannot escape through moving parts of the engine. This due to its peculiar design. So, if you have an engine in your car that suffers from oil pumping, just grind the valves (perhaps reseatings is necessary) before you resort to the major and more expensive remedies, and you might be surprised at the results. This week's articles will deal entirely with oil pumping of motors and the remedies. (To narrow proper lubrication and grade of oil to use.

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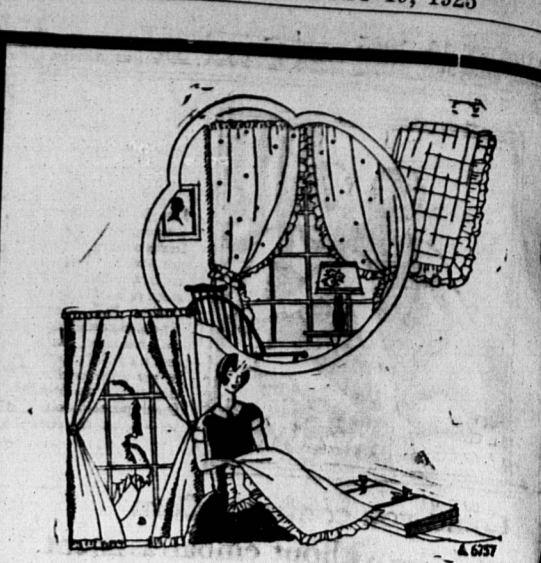
