In a few spots the fans who still take their bike racing seriously have an opportunity to do a lot of lusty cheering and a lot of sleep missing when the six-day troupes stage their usual winter grinds.

The average bike race fan may figure that the boys who participate in these gruelling grinds may retire to a secluded spot in the Summer where they live the life of Rolly. Nothing of the sort. Baseball players may retire during the off season and put on

fat, but the boys who perform in the long grinds during the Winter ship their bikes East, where they do short sprinting on enclosed ovals during the Summer for the edification of large mobs of dyed-in-the-wool fans.

New York City — where the cheery welcome of "Hello, Sucker!" originated — falls for the racket harder than a visiting cloak and suit buyer falls for an ex-Follies girl. New York, with all of its smartness, crowds its way into the bike tracks and yells its foolish head off as the riders whirl madly around the oval. And there are other spots near New York where the game buds, is nourished, and flourishes.

Franco Georgetti, the Italian, who has a big following wherever six-day

grinds are ground, is one of the best of the sprinters who helps drag thousands into the tracks around New York. Early in his career as a bike rider Franco became famous as the fellow who ate miles of spaghetti during every six-day grind. Today he is famous as a rider and still enjoys the elongated national dish of Italy.

Georgetti has been crowned motor-paced champion of the Eastern arenas for two years in succession and he is already well started on the dash for his third title. When the opening gun of the outdoor season was fired, Franco got away with a string of victories.

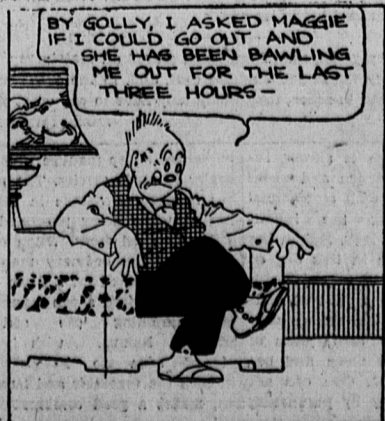

Dr. T. B. Acker Held Clinic At Summerside

A clinic for crippled children was held on Friday in the Red Cross room in the Town Hall, Summerside, by Dr. T. B. Acker, of Halifax. Miss Wilson, head of the Red Cross in Charlottetown, was with Dr. Acker and Miss Zinck the local nurse. Thirty patients were examined and the doctor and nurses were busy from nine o'clock in the morning until eight o'clock in the evening. This is the eighth clinic conducted by Dr. Acker in this province and his advice is eagerly sought, as he has a splendid reputation on the Island. The children examined were all from Prince County, most of them coming in to Summerside by car. There were four Summerside cases. Dr. Acker thoroughly examined each child and instructed the parents or the different exercises for the arms and legs for treatment of impaired muscles. The parents and children listened very attentively and showed great willingness to do all that they could to carry out his instructions. At five o'clock Dr. Acker and the nurses took four patients over to the Prince County Hospital to have a manipulation examination. They were there until eight o'clock.

Three cases for hip trouble had plaster casts put on and remained in the hospital.

The other patient, who had a cast put on for a club foot was able to go home that evening. The local doctors did all they could to assist Dr. Acker in his work; also the matron and nurses of the hospital. While in Summerside Dr. Acker was entertained by Dr. J. C. Simpson and Miss Wilson by Miss Gladys Holman. Dr. Acker returned to Charlottetown on Friday evening and on the way visited a patient in Kensington. He will return in the fall to examine the patients.
