**P. E. I. R. Nurses Hear Fine Address**  
 The following address was submitted by Mrs. Katharine MacLennan, R. N. President of the P. E. I. Registered Nurses Association at Tuesday's annual meeting of the organization in Summerside.  
 Once again I beg to submit my report as President of the Prince Edward Island Registered Nurses Association. As in the year 1941-42, so in the year 1942-43, our association has endeavored to perform its various activities by keeping before the members and the public the importance of its work and the need for maintaining as high a standard as possible.  
 We are very grateful to those inactive nurses who have responded to our call and helped us by doing private duty nursing or by returning general duty. We are grateful also to the wives of the men of the Armed Forces from distant places who, while residing in our communities, have offered their services so willingly to our own nurses who have remained in their positions, doing private duty, public health or institutional work, and thus kept the civilian machinery functioning. We owe a debt of thanks. But for these seriously-minded women, our provincial association would be facing a more acute problem than it is facing. Let us hope this spirit of co-operation will become more marked than it already is and that each and every graduate nurse will realize a definite responsibility rests with her.  
 Last year our Federal Government, in response to an urgent appeal from the Canadian Nurses Association, gave to each provincial association a financial grant to be used for teaching additional students who had been admitted to nursing schools to meet the wartime emergency. For the first time in the history of nursing in Prince Edward Island, we procured a full-time travelling instructor who gave centralized lectures to student nurses in Charlottetown and, as well, carried out a teaching program in Summerside. Miss M. Pringle, Emergency Nursing Advisor for New Brunswick very successfully undertook this work. In addition, our association obtained the part-time services of a dietitian, a nurse and instructors for science from Prince of Wales College and Summerside High School to further expand the teaching program.

**ANNUALS PROVIDE PASTURE HIGH IN PROTEIN**  
 (Experimental Farm News)  
 Shortage of high protein feeds and concentrates compels the farmer to grow crops that will meet his own requirements. Legume hay of good quality and pastures properly managed will offset this shortage. But in the event that perennial grass and legume pastures are not adequate for the livestock carried this year it is necessary to resort to annuals. If grazed and kept in the young growing stage these will provide abundance of feed high in protein, says F. S. Nowosad, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.  
 Spring rye seeded at 2 bushels per acre will give the earliest pasture. It is ready to be grazed in about 4 weeks from the date of seeding. Oats seeded alone at 2 bushels are more productive than spring rye and may be grazed in 5 weeks after seeding.  
 While oats seeded alone are most commonly used for pasture, it is more desirable to seed them in a mixture with other crops. A mixture of 2 bushels of oats and 1 bushel of spring or fall rye, or 2 bushels of oats and 20 pounds of Sudan grass will give excellent pasturage early in the summer. The last mentioned mixture should not be seeded as early as oats alone, because Sudan grass makes its best growth when the soil is warm or when the conditions are suitable for corn.  
 Sudan grass alone at 30 pounds per acre or corn drilled in 20 pounds per acre will provide excellent pasture late in the fall for sheep, hogs or beef cattle.
