The big front line of Providence Reds International-American League hockey team kept firing its salvo of shots at opposing teams' nets last week and records today showed the trio of Jackie Keating, Duggie Kuhn and Sammy McManus with 62 scoring points to its credit with slightly more than half the season gone.

Keating, playmaker of the all-Maritime line and once a Saint John "saver," is tops among all league Maritimers in the league with 27 points, seven better than Kuhn, who comes from Kentville, McManus, a former Moncton Hawk holds third position with 15 points, just one more than "Nig" Brennan, now with Cleveland but formerly of Charlottetown.

Ron Hudson of Pittsburgh, who played amateur hockey with Halifax Wolves, has 12 points, while another old-time Moncton Hawk, Bert Connolly, is two more points back.

## Jacobs Not Worried By Fight Boycott

NEW YORK, Jan. 18 — (AP) — From the deep seated comfort of an over-stuffed lounging chair at the Hippodrome Punch Bowl today, Joe Jacobs rolled a 10-inch cigar around his lips and guessed that boycott of the Max Schmeling-Jimmy Braddock fight "should have stood in bed."

The heavyweight championship fight between Maxie and Jimmy will go on as scheduled, June 3, with a bigger and better crowd than was anticipated before the boycott raised its head, predicted little Yussel.

Schmeling, he announced with pride, will arrive in New York one month from today, make a nationwide exhibition tour of 22 cities over five weeks, and then begin training for his heavyweight title shot.

"After people in those exhibition cities see Maxie and find out what a gentleman he is," gurgled little Yussel, "they'll be for him, too."

"I don't mind telling you the boycott had no scared into stiff-necking," said Maxie's manager. "But the worm has turned over. Even a lot of my Jewish friends have come to me and said the boycott was all wrong."

Little Yussel, the kind of a fellow who spends his money faster than he gets it, can't understand why the Jews want to boycott the fight anyway.

"What's the matter with Maxie make men?" he asked. "They would get it even if he does fight."

"The fighting Joe Louis, Maxie's cut was \$100,000. Out of that he took \$20,000 back to Germany, leaving the rest behind to pay expenses and taxes."

## Same Trick But Effect Was Reverse

"Don't try a trick from the old master's bag unless you're sure you can swing it."

Rep. Vincent Harrington, broad-shouldered new Congressman from Iowa who played guard with Notre Dame's famous "Four Horsemen" in 1924, told this story:

"One year we went south to play Georgia Tech and Rock uncorked a psychological trick that struck me as something good to remember and use when I began coaching."

"In the dressing room he gave us his usual pep talk—and old Rock could lay it on. We were all keyed up. Just before he went on the field, a telegraph messenger rushed in. Rock read the message, shed a tear or two and read it to us with a shaking voice."

"It supposedly was from his young boy, saying he was hurt, or something, and wanted us to win the game for him. So Rock pleaded with us to win the game for the youngster."

"Well, we played like demons and gave Tech a good licking. Old Rock was a master."

A few years later, Harrington was coaching Columbia, now Portland, Ore., College, and decided to borrow Rockne's psychology to clinch a big game triumph.

"I gave the boys a fight talk and then the messenger barged in with the telegram. I didn't have any kiddies, so I had to use my mother as the unfortunate, bed-ridden one who wanted us to win for her."

"But I overplayed my hand. The boys played listlessly and we got trimmed. They were so worried about my mother's health they couldn't concentrate on football."

## Cowley Continues Leading Point-maker As Maritimers Experience Quiet Week

MONTREAL, Jan. 18—(CP)—The past week was a quiet one among the ranks of former Maritimers in the National Hockey League and only five scoring points were accumulated by the 10 players. As a result the records showed few changes tonight.

Bill Cowley, former Halifax Wolverine and present leading scorer for Boston Bruins, held his place at the top of the pile by increasing his total one point to 19. Three points back were his team-mate Ray Getlife, a Charlottetown boy, and Eddie Wiseman, New York Amerks who hails from Newcastle, Canada's Joffre Desilets, once of Saint John, claimed next ranking with 14 points, but right on his heels with 12 was Gordie Drillon, husky Moncton boy, who this year has been one of Toronto Maple Leafs prize rookies.

Individual Honors Go To Red Wings

MONTREAL, Jan. 18—(CP)—It was another Detroit week in the National Hockey League. Official scoring statistics issued tonight showed the Red Wings hanging on to most of the League's individual honors while the team stayed out in front of the United States section.

Up on top of the point-getters were Larry Aurie and Morty Barry, front-line mates of the Wings, with 25 points apiece. Barry, picking up a goal and a brace of assists, drew even with Aurie during the week.

Aurie's 15 goals also gave him the league leadership in marksmanship, while Marty's 18 assists place him at the top in this division.

A single point behind the Detroiters in points is old Johnny Gagnon, the rejuvenated right-winger of Montreal Canadiens. The Black Cat got three points during the week to break his first-place tie with Sweeney Schriner of New York Americans in the Canadian section.

But another Amerk continued to run in front in one race. Belligerent Allan Shields was still away ahead in penalty time, having served out 77 minutes on the mouners' bench. 29 more than Red Horner of Toronto Maple Leafs.

## Leading U. S. Jumper For Grand National

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Jan. 14 — What Have You, one of the United States' outstanding jumpers, sails tomorrow to compete in the Grand National Steeplechase at Aintree, Eng., March 19.

The nine-year-old chestnut son of Tryster-Prodigy, owned by Frank M. Gould, won three races over the jumps last year. He qualified for the Grand National by taking the three miles of the Fair Hills, Md., National and in addition scored once each at Belmont Park and the United Hunts meeting at Roslyn, N. Y. The latter races were at 2 1-2 miles.

What Have You has been taking the jumps since he was turned into a steeplechaser in 1932 by Hirsch Jacobs, America's leading trainer for the last four years. After racing twice over the fences under Jacobs' guidance, he was sold to Gould.

Made Tour With English College Team

Alan (Toby) Macmillan, prominent in junior hockey here a few seasons ago and later with Acadia and Boston University, and who is now doing post-graduate work in England, spent three weeks of the holiday season touring the continent with an English hockey team.

Says System Of Selecting Star Wrong

CHICAGO, Jan. 18—(CP)—Trials and tribulations of hockey's goal-tenders have lately been subject of a survey by Clem Loughlin, Coach of Chicago Black Hawks' and today the veteran pilot came up with results of his probing. He thinks the National League's system of selecting its "goalie of the year" is all wrong.

Loughlin, a defenceman during his playing years, pointed out that the Vezina Trophy is given each season to the N.H.L. netminder with the lowest total of goals scored against him.

Loughlin thinks the league has the wrong idea.

"The cups they can lay their hands on," he declared. "They're the forgotten men of hockey."

"But the plan of awarding the Vezina Trophy doesn't give much chance to the goalie whose team is weak defensively. He's got to work a good deal harder than the goalie who has a strong guard in front of him."

To illustrate his point, Loughlin said that in 1928-29 Roy Worters of New York Americans won the trophy annually to the player adjudged most valuable to his team, but failed to win the Vezina trophy that year because George Hainsworth, with Montreal Canadiens at that time had been scored against less frequently.

"I think the league's top goalie should be decided by a poll of hockey experts," said Loughlin today. "The trophy should go to the goalie who has been most valuable to his team—not to the one who has been fortunate enough to get the best protection."

## Bargain Bill Scheduled For Forum Tonight

## Three Games Scheduled In National League Tonight

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) Little rests on the outcome tonight of three games in the National Hockey League but the opportunity of the high-flying Montreal Canadiens and Detroit Red Wings to entrench themselves more solidly at the top of their respective sections while Toronto Maple Leafs, Boston Bruins and Chicago Black Hawks have the chance to get going on the home stretch.

Canadiens move to New York to meet Rangers before starting on the "suicide trip" next Saturday. The Montrealers go to New York leaving defenceman Babe Siebert and centreman Pete Lepine behind, but that's not worrying them much.

Both the players were on the sidelines last Saturday and Canadiens went in there to trounce Maroons as they hadn't been trounced in an inter-city game in years.

The lowly Chicago Hawks travel to Detroit to meet Red Wings, leaders of the National League's American section by a six point margin. Hawks, whose wins this year have been few and far between, hope the game will produce victory number seven. And they are in need of the two points if they hope to reach a play-off position before the looming season-end.

In the Detroit camp there is no anxiety over the contest. Maple Leafs invade the rink of their arch-enemies, Boston Bruins. To Bruins a win would mean possible step into second position in the American section and to Toronto a step in the right direction.
