THE COUNTRY'S BEST INTEREST.

It must be a matter of regret and pain to thoughtful citizens that in an election campaign the true interests of the country are swallowed up and lost sight of in the bitterness of party strife. In an ideal system of government the people at election times would be calmly and in the most friendly and disinterested spirit taking counsel together as to wisest and best men to represent them in the councils of the nation, and the measures most conducive to public order, progress and prosperity within the commonwealth. This is not what we see and hear about us today. There is no judicial calm in the political atmosphere; there is little honest fairness in the public discussion. On the contrary the air is filled with party battle-cries, angry and excited contention half truths, plausible sophistries and even gross misrepresentations, calculated to confuse rather than to enlighten the public mind. The sole object appears to be to gain votes in support of the party standards, by any means, however unfair and even unlawful.

If it were only the country's best interest that were sought, there would be no need and no desire to set in motion the corrupt and corrupting agencies which the strife of parties has evolved. There would be no need of the machines, the whiskey satchels and the bribery funds which in so many constituencies have been painfully in evidence to the shame of Canada in the past. We have here in Prince Edward Island what is mainly a well-ordered, industrious, God-fearing community which THE GUARDIAN has with pleasure commended as the peer of any in Canada or in the world in its exemption from vice and crime. We have a loyal and patriotic citizenship. These are favorable and hopeful conditions. But our numbers are few, and our larger interests are wholly at the mercy of a great Parliament in which we can have less than the one fortieth part of the total membership. Why then should we become party-mad and lose sight of the great interests that are at stake in more eagerness to win a victory for one party or the other? It must be to thoughtful persons as clear as the sun at noonday, that we cannot afford to do this.

THE GUARDIAN has no interest in parties as such. It is bound to neither party by any ties of favor or affection; it fears nothing that either party can do against it, for no party can take away or destroy the favor which it holds among the thousands of the best people of Prince Edward Island, who are its patrons. But we have a sincere and abiding interest in the welfare of this fair Island and of the broad and noble Dominion to which the Island is inseparably bound. There are great financial, industrial and commercial interests at stake; much is involved as regards our progress and prosperity in our lines of communications summer and winter by rail and steamer. But there are other and even greater interests than these. Honest, efficient government, pure and impartial courts, just and wise laws faithfully administered, that make for peace, order and sobriety—these are even of greater moment than the interests which are purely material. A nation of drunkards would constitute a hell. A nation whose public men are devoid of honor would speedily become infamous. Let us not in the bitter strife of factions and of parties lose sight of these greater things in which the most momentous interests

of our own and of future generations are involved.

If it must need be that under our system of government there shall be political parties, then it becomes the duty of honest, patriotic citizens not to be swayed by party spirit beyond the bounds of what is due to the best interest of our Island home and the Dominion at large. We ought to select able and competent men, that our Island may obtain its just due as the smallest province among many larger, richer and more populous. We ought, for our own credit, and for the honor and welfare of the entire commonwealth, to demand of our public men that they shall be honest, clean and sober in their lives. We ought to use our most earnest endeavor to secure a pure election that shall give full and free expression to the will of the people. Let no countenance be given to unfair, corrupt or unlawful methods. And above all party claims, above all individual interests, the honest, patriotic Christian elector should keep in sight the great moral as well as the material interests involved, the fair fame and honor of his country. We are about to enter the polling booths to discharge one of the greatest, noblest and most responsible duties of an excited citizenship. We are about to choose a parliament that shall rule over half a continent in the dawning years of the twentieth century. It is fitting that the choice be made calmly, intelligently, free from the trammels of party, and that our choice shall be of able, worthy, and patriotic men whom God and the verdict of our posterity shall approve.
