Dr. W. P. Broderick, State Deputy of the Knights of Columbus arrived in the city by the early train Monday evening to organize a separate state for the above Order. The Convention was held in the K. of C. Home at 8 o'clock with the following delegates in attendance: Charlottetown, Messrs. Louis Wynne and G. J. McCormac; Souris, Messrs. Wade Hughes and Donald Lavie; Summerside, Leonard McNeill and Adrian Arsenault. Also in attendance were District Deputy J. A. McDonald and Supreme Master of the 4th Degree for the Maritime Provinces, Dr. W. J. McMillan. The following state officers were elected: State Deputy, Dr. W. J. McMillan, Charlottetown; State Sec'y, Leonard McNeill, Summerside; State Treasurer, Wade Hughes, Souris; State Advocate, Adrian Arsenault, Summerside; State Warden, J. A. McDonald, Charlottetown; State Chaplain, His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, Charlottetown. Past Deputy John M. Hughes and State Deputy, Dr. W. J. McMillan were selected as delegates to attend the Supreme Convention to be held in Chicago this coming summer. Messrs. J. A. McDonald and Adrian Arsenault were chosen as alternates. The organizing of a separate state for P. E. Island is a great advantage to the Councils throughout the Province inasmuch as all State business will, in future, be transacted in this Province instead of delegates attending conventions in other cities, either in Nova Scotia or New Brunswick. After the meeting an address and handsome traveling bag was presented to Dr. Broderick on behalf of all the Prince Edward Island Knights to which he made a fitting reply.

Premier Meighen Makes Brilliant Defense

(Continued from Page One) section. Now, Mr. Crerar knows nobody of any sense ever said that. "What we say is this: that it is not in the interests of this dominion to put ourselves in a position where we are helpless in the hands of the United States Legislature. We would like to sell them all the goods we can, but we are not going to adopt a tariff policy that puts us at their mercy whenever they decide to put their tariff barriers up. I was explaining to you that there was considerable risk that they would. Have I ground for that? Just run your mind back over the last few years. About ten years ago they were anxious for reciprocity in natural products, and they thought the time had come for that. They got out our natural products, got up finished articles and sell them and make a profit on them. They felt they had everything to gain by taking the barriers down, and we had everything to lose. Fortunately, we rejected that proposal. "Wheat on the free list. This spread like fire through the Western Provinces. I was a member of the government that put this on the free list. What has happened? They put wheat and flour on the free list—then the war came on in a very short time. We could not possibly allow this during that time, but that time was over last fall. Free wheat and flour went into effect about last September, and it just took, I think, five months or four, until the Fordney Young bill was introduced to put 35 cents duty on wheat and 25 cents on flour and the United States proposes to put the bill through and virtually drive this wheat and flour out of the United States. That is as long as you can depend on them. What is the result? "We now have to find another market for our flour and deliver it to the ultimate consumer. Fortunately it didn't last long for us. The longer it lasts the worse. Now we have to find our own markets and get our wheat to the man who needs the wheat. We will treat with the consuming public direct. Don't you think it is better now to do that? "As to the Fordney tariff, it is to be put in effect very shortly now. It is a temporary measure, it is true, but the man is very optimistic indeed who imagines that it is not permanent. "A while ago they offered us free potatoes if we would give them free potatoes, and that lasted about two and a half years, and now we have the Fordney bill and the barriers up. "Here are our markets today where products of every kind come over the line into Canada. Here is a barrier up against the farmers selling their produce, and what is the Farmers' Party doing? They are asked to support? Free foodstuff for the Dominion of Canada. That is what you are going to vote for if you vote for Mr. Stairs. The tariff against everything you send over there, and do you let their goods come into Canada free? Is there anybody wants to do this? "Do you know that in this country today, take it on the average—and we have had it investigated—our farmers are getting their implements just as cheaply as in corresponding points in the United States. Does anybody think that we ought to pursue a policy in this country that is going to bring the effective termination of the farming industry of this dominion by the great price of the U. S. Do you think we should do that, even if we reduced by a dollar or so the price of farming implements here? Situation is Critical. "But in the next place do you want this country to be in the position it is sure to be in a very short time if you throw all these articles on the free list? Take the countries of the world. You won't find one of them where implements can be bought as cheaply as United States and Canada, and in both of these countries the industries have been built up under a protective tariff. Let me deal with it in just a little wider way. I mention the Fordney Young tariff that is now going into effect in the United States. It is against the whole world. It is not just against Canada. They are doing this because they think it is best raised in those countries in order to stabilize the industries that were shaken and are now being readjusted after the war. Take Great Britain herself, which up to now is the only free trading country in the civilized world. What is Great Britain doing? Even in Great Britain under the stress of these times they are getting to other devices to protect their own trade. They are controlling importations—coal, bacon, beef, etc., and seeing to it that the home producer gets a show. "In the face of all that, we are called upon by the Farmer party to take our tariff barriers down to let the producers of every other

A Great Concert Co., at Prince Edward

One of the most enjoyable and delightful entertainments given in the Prince Edward for some time was that contributed by the Lauder Co., on Tuesday evening. This is a company of amateurs from Amherst, N. S., and if it be a sample of the talent latent in that enterprising center of Nova Scotia, Amherst must certainly be an enviable place to live in. The company included a quartette, a soprano, a violinist and two child dancers. Although it has taken the name of the Lauder Concert Co., the programme does not consist entirely, or even for the greater part of the productions of that great Scotch Comedian. The contributions were more of a classical description than of comedy, although of course the premier Scotch vaudeville artist was well represented. The quartette consisted of Miss Lillian Herman, soprano, Miss Ruby Farnell, alto, Mr. G. T. Vallance, tenor and Mr. G. R. Shiers, Bass. They contributed such choice selections as "Annie Laurie", "Flow Gently Sweet Afton," and "Bonnie Heather", and the harmony and delightful blending of the voices could hardly be excelled. They were recalled again and again. The two ladies also contributed duets of more than average quality and finish. They responded to recalls again and again. Miss Farnell and Miss Herman as solists have few equals on the amateur stage and both could hardly give enough to satisfy the delighted audience. Mr. Shiers is gifted with a very deep bass and was particularly good on the low notes. Mr. G. T. Vallance, who is a brother of Lady Lauder, rendered his songs and stories in enviable manner, and was repeatedly encored. The violinist, Miss Mary Lusby, has a complete mastery of the technique of the violin, and drew from it exquisite melodies for which she received rapturous applause. The child dancers, the McKinnon sisters, were exceedingly pretty and effective in their contributions, which included in addition to the Highland Fling; The Sailor's Hornpipe, and some modern dances. Early Saturday morning, it is presumed between one and three o'clock, some one entered the Country Club and got away with nearly all the stock kept on hand there. It is not yet known the exact amount, but the club was completely cleared out of cigars, pipe tobaccos, bananas, 17,000 cigarettes and 1,000 dance tickets. The Manager, Mr. Leslie Hughes, worked until 12 o'clock, midnight on Friday, leaving everything locked up and at seven o'clock Saturday morning the caretaker noticed some of the goods missing but thought they had been put away in a cupboard, which was sometimes done. Everything else was just as they were left the previous night, even all the doors being locked. It is supposed entrance was made with a skeleton key through the side door, and by some one who knew where everything was kept. No trace has yet been found of the burglars but the police are on the case and developments may be expected soon.

"Do you know what we were buying from them in 1911? In 1911 when the Liberal party went into power we were only buying \$223,000,000—over \$300,000,000 of an adverse balance of trade between us in one year; and that is not good enough to suit them. They are putting their tariff up so that they will buy less from us. AND WE ARE SOLEMNLY TOLD IT IS THE THING FOR US TO DO TO TAKE OUR BARRIERS DOWN SO THAT every man, woman and child in the United States averaged \$4.40, and every man, woman and child in this country bought \$100.45, and Mr. Irvine and Mr. Stairs say the thing for us to do is to take our barriers down all along the line, so that we will buy more than \$100.45 apiece, and consequently they will buy less than \$4.40 apiece from us. Does it sound sane? Exchange Case. "Before the war our money was at par because we borrowed the money overseas and paid the United States in their own coin. We were getting into debt. We did it at home, as we do now, through the Victory loans, and we did not have to buy American dollars at all. Now everybody knows that, except Mr. Crerar. The only way in the world we can correct this would be to produce more, sell more, and buy less. "Last year it cost \$50,000,000 in exchange alone in the United States, and the way these people are thinking of remedying that is to buy less from the United States by taking down the tariff in order to buy more? I think you are just as capable of reasoning this thing out as I am. Look over the world today, look at France, look at Italy, look at Spain, Belgium, yes, look at Great Britain herself.
