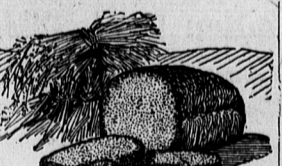

Price of Liquor Reduced also Number of "Scripts"

At the monthly meeting of the Prohibition Commission held Thursday, under the chairmanship of Mr. James Paton, it was agreed to appoint Mr. J. B. Heywood Chief Prohibition Inspector in succession to Mr. George H. Barbour, who has been appointed Chief Preventive Officer under the Dominion Government. It was also decided to reduce the price of liquor considerably, and to restrict the number of "scripts" to 50 per medical practitioner per month, to be strictly adhered to. Attention was drawn to Section 47 (a copy of which has been sent to each doctor), referring to the abuse and illegal use of "scripts" for other than medicinal purposes.
