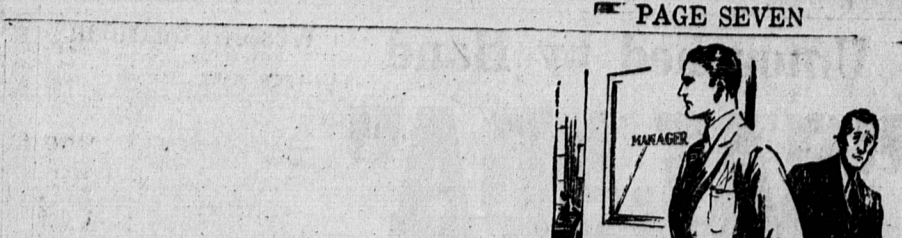

MR. PETER HARPER.
The people of Tignish were held grief-stricken, when the sad tidings greeted their ears of the sudden and unexpected death of Peter Harper, who died at his home in Tignish, Friday, March 11th, after a period of lingering illness. But the grief of the people was incomparable with that which was experienced at the home of the deceased, where a sorrowing mother lingered at his bedside, scarcely able to realize that before her lay the lifeless body of her beloved husband, who was called away from her side to meet his Creator, leaving both her and his family to the loving protection of an all-wise God. In the quiet of the afternoon air, the angel of Death swooped down on the soul of the dying man to bear it to light to judgement, closing cold in death the eyes of the patient sufferer, who, resigned to the will of Providence met his fate with unquestionable resignation. The deceased died in the prime of life, being forty-six years of age, and until a year or more ago, was a strong healthy man, almost invariably capable of losing his abundant energy in such a short length of time. Many mournful faces gave vent to flowing tears when the corpse was lowered in the grave and the day did not close without a feeling of loss. We hope and trust that God, when all will be merciful, has given him a fitting and honorable judgment and that he will one day be numbered with His Saints in Heaven.
