IN MEMORIAM

MRS. MARY ANN HYNES.
 With deep regret The Guardian chronicles the death of an old and highly respected resident of Vernon River, in the person of Mrs. Mary Hynes, who died at the residence of her son, Thomas Hynes, on Sunday evening, June 6th, aged 90 years. Her maiden name was Mary Ann Dunn. Her husband, Andrew Hynes, predeceased her seventeen years ago. Twelve children were born of this marriage, nine of whom are still living. She also leaves to cherish her memory, 44 grand-children and 5 great grand-children. She was a devoted wife and mother and a devout Catholic. Fortified by the last rites of Holy Church, with her family gathered around her, she departed this life in holy confidence. Her funeral on Tuesday morning, to St. Joachim's Church was largely attended. A High Mass of Requiem was sung by the pastor, Rev. P. D. McLaughlin, who visited her frequently during her brief illness of two weeks.

MR. ANGUS N. BELL.
 The community of Bell River was shocked on Sabbath morning the 13th inst. by the sad news that Angus N. Bell had passed away at 8 a. m. that same morning. The late Mr. Bell was only in the prime of life, a man of fine personal appearance and was the very picture of health and strength a few days before his death. He was overheated working in the field and while in that condition drank freely of cold water and was taken seriously ill, in a short time thereafter and succumbed within a few days. The deceased was an enterprising farmer, a kind-hearted man and a good neighbor. He leaves to mourn their loss a disconsolate widow, and five young children, an aged mother and one sister. The funeral took place on Monday, June 14th and was largely attended. Rev. John Gillis, his pastor, conducted the services. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved family and their friends.

MRS. DONALD MCINTYRE.
 There passed away at Newport on June 7th, after a short illness due to heart failure, Margaret, relict of the late Donald McIntyre, in the 85th year of her age. The deceased was a general favorite in the community in which she lived, possessing a cheerful disposition, kind and sympathetic, together with religious zeal that was reflected in all her actions. She received the last rites of the Catholic Church from the hands of her pastor, Rev. D. J. G. McDonald. She leaves to mourn two sons and two daughters, Patrick, on his farm, near John D. Mrs. Charles Dodge and Barbara, of Boston, Mass. Her funeral to St. George's Church on Wednesday, the 9th, was very largely attended, relatives and friends being present to pay the last tribute of respect to one who was beloved by all. Requiem Mass was sung by Rev. J. C. McLean, V. G., nephew of the deceased. The services at the grave were performed by Rev. A. McAulay, assisted by Rev. J. C. McMillan. R. I. P.

WIFE BEATER IS WHIPPED BY COURT.
 To Charles S. Dove, of Middlebrook, Md., belongs the distinction of being the first white man to be whipped in Montgomery County for wife beating. Following his conviction in the police court at Rockville, Md., the other morning on a charge of brutally assaulting his young wife, Ruby Dove, Judge Arthur Mace, sentenced him to receive 15 lashes upon his bare back. The whipping was administered in the jail yard by Sheriff Payton Whalen in the presence of the jail physician and a number of witnesses. Sheriff Whalen did not spare the defendant, several of the lashes drawing blood. Dove stood the ordeal silently although he winced perceptibly a number of times. Immediately afterward he was released and proceeded to his home, apparently little the worse for his experience. Dove was the third man to be sentenced to the whipping post by Judge Mace, the other two being colored. In the opinion of Judge Mace, there is entirely too much cruelty on the part of husbands to their wives, and he has let it be understood that in all cases in which convictions are had before him the whipping post will be the penalty.

THE PRINCE EDWARD

As a writer for the moving picture stage James Oliver Curwood is well known, and his plays never fail to command an extensive popularity. One of his best efforts, "In Defiance of the Law," was shown at the Prince Edward Theatre last evening to an overwhelming house and proved an extraordinarily successful feature. The picture consisted of three long parts and the "scenario" lent itself readily to development. It was a story of the Canadian North West in the heart of winter, and the scenery throughout was magnificent. A man is alleged to have committed murder, and to avoid the police he and his wife set out for the wilderness, leaving their only child in the care of a devoted squaw. Travelling by day the woman hauls a box sleigh, in which her husband lies concealed, plodding her weary, lonesome way through the snow, assisted in a meagre way by one dog that strains at the traces. In this plight she encounters Billy McVeigh, of the Mounted Police, and in reply to his enquiries she informs him that in the sleigh is the dead body of her husband. His suspicions being thus relieved, he helps her erect the tent in which she proposes passing the night, and then retires himself to a sheltered spot some distance off. While he is asleep at night the woman stealthily creeps up to him, steals his gun and leaving him a note, goes off with her husband. Some time during the following day he comes up to them and quite unexpectedly arrests the husband, handcuffing him. The man, broken in spirit, tells his pitiful story and the officer lets him go. In the result he loses his position. Some time after the husband dies and, after rescuing the woman's child, Billy, who all along was in love with her, marries the heroine. The story was altogether excellent. "The Hazards of Helen" was again effervescent with excitement and the pretty heroine shows some remarkable acrobatic skill. The instalment of "The Master Key" was unusually good, and its seriousness was relieved by a wholesome touch of humour provided by old "Tom Kane." This number is of special importance, as it finds the enemy in possession of the treasures. "All Over the Blazes" was a "ripping" comedy and provided continuous laughter.

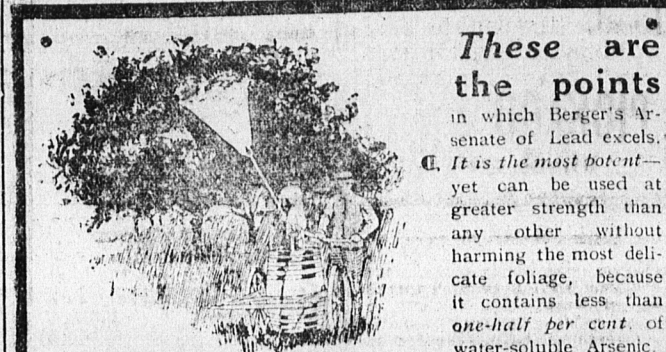
HANG THE KAISER
