MADE IN CANADA

Steamer Disabled

OGDENSBURG, N.Y., July 18. — Passengers are being landed slowly today from the steamer Rapids King, of the Canadian Steamship Lines, which was disabled in the Long Sault Rapids, in the St. Lawrence River yesterday. Because of the dangerous current the passengers were being taken off in a small boat attached to a strong cable at the rate of only twenty an hour. No lives were lost. The accident is said by old river men to be the first of its kind in the Long Sault Rapids in more than fifty years, and occurred yesterday afternoon when the Rapids King bound from Prescott, Ont., to Montreal, broke her rudder chain. With much difficulty the crew by means of the tiller managed to beach the vessel 75 feet from Barnhardt's Island.

The passengers, majority of whom were tourists, including several newly-married couples, were thrown into a small panic when the accident occurred. Captain Batten and members of the crew, assisted by two sisters of charity who were passengers, were prompt and quiet to reassure them. The passengers spent an anxious night, and few even attempted to procure sleep. At a late hour several large searchlights were arranged on the shore and played upon the stranded vessel. The work of rescue began at 8 o'clock this morning. A lifeboat capable of holding seven passengers, the captain and two members of a crew, were attached to the cable. The boat was then hauled ashore by twenty men, then back by windlass to aboard the steamer.

Canadian Pacific Denies Charges

WINNIPEG, July 15.—After an investigation made at the request of Hon. T. A. Crerar, the Canadian Pacific Railway has made full denial of the Henderson charges made before the Royal Grain Inquiry Board at Fort William with reference to the transfer of the terminal elevators "D" and "E" from the Canadian Pacific Railway to the United Grain Growers, Limited. Robert Henderson, former employee of the company, charged, among other things, that forty thousand bushels of grain belonging to the Canadian Pacific had been concealed from the company when the transfer was made. In a letter to D. C. Coleman, vice-president of the C. P. R., Hon. T. A. Crerar, on June 13, offered every facility for an enquiry. Mr. Coleman replied on June 14, stating the enquiry was being made, and on July 11 again wrote Mr. Crerar, declaring "We are convinced that proper accounting was made to us for all the grain in the elevators, when turned over to your company."

With reference to other charges made by Henderson as to misconduct in connection with the elevators, Mr. Crerar, on June 29, wrote L. H. Boyd, K. C., chairman of the Board of Grain Commissioners, asking for an enquiry by the board into the Henderson charges. "Upon being advised that you are prepared to undertake this investigation, we are prepared to give you all the assistance in our power," this letter stated. The board replied on July 8, stating the request would be acceded to, and the enquiry made as soon as other meetings already arranged for had been dealt with. The correspondence was made public this morning by Hon. T. A. Crerar.
