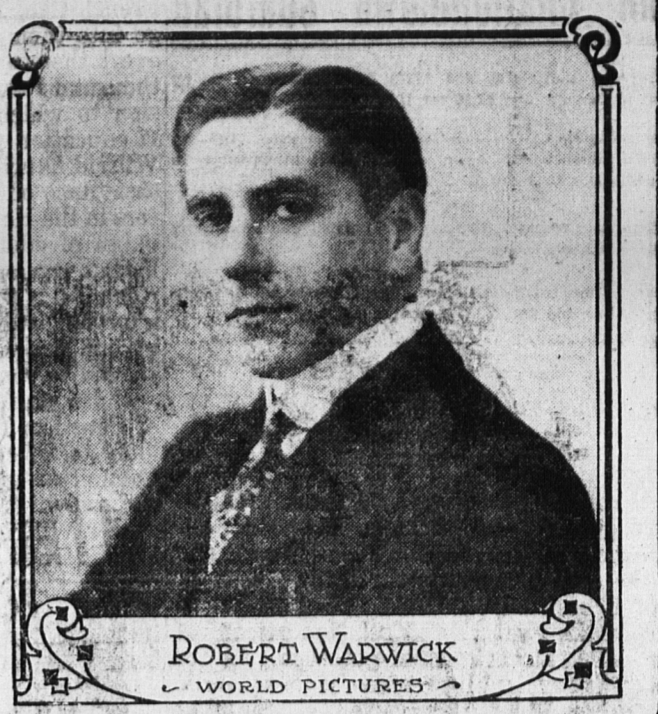

Out of the red horror of Butte, with its myriad of hear, rending incidents of suffering and death, there stands high above his fellows the figure of a man...

When the first positive knowledge of their terrifying predicament came to the group of entombed men, they were seized by a panic and never faltered. He drove them to build a barricade to strip themselves of their own clothing to stop the crevices through which the deadly gas might seep.

But the humble nipper kept his nerve. Resolutely he took his stand, his back to the barricade, and fought off the men who would have hurled him astride, and opened the portal through which would have come their death. Leader he remained to the end, and then, seized by the flames, straggling which he had so long protected his fellows, he rambled away into a gas-filled corridor. He has not been found. He will not be found alive. He was the love greater than which is of no man—to lay down his life for the saving of others.
