MEETING OF THE PRESBYTERY

Continued from page 1
McDonald at O'Leary, on March 26th instant, at 7.30 p.m., as follows:—
Mr. W. A. McKay to preside and in-
duct, Mr. Wm. McLeod to preach, Mr.
George Millar to address the minister,
and Mr. W. A. Mason to the people.
Serving of the edict was left in the
hands of the interim moderator of
session.

It was moved by Mr. T. F. Fullerton, seconded by Mr. George Millar, and carried, that the Presbytery congratulate Bloomfield, O'Leary, West Cape and Brae on the solidarity it has attained under the efficient ministry of Mr. McDonald, and expressed gratification at the prospect of the settlement and best wishes for future prosperity.

The following rules and regulations for the McKenzie Fund were on motion adopted.

1. That a Savings Bank account be opened in the Bank of Nova Scotia in the names of the joint treasurers.
2. That all remittances, which should be made to Mr. T. C. James, Charlottetown, be acknowledged with out delay by post card, and that a further acknowledgement be made in the Presbyterian Witness, or Patriot.

3. That each congregation keep a separate account of amounts contributed to this fund, and submit a statement of the names and amounts contributed to their annual meeting.

4. That expenses such as postal card circulars, postage, etc. be a charge upon the fund.

5. That remittances be made to the treasurer of the church at Halifax quarterly or half yearly as the Foreign Mission committee may direct.

6. That the state of the fund be reported to Presbytery from time to time, and that an annual statement properly audited by submitted at the next quarterly meeting each year.

The following resolution was moved by Mr. Geo. Millar, seconded by Mr. Hugh McMillan and carried:— That this Presbytery appoints the following committee to express at the public meeting this evening in Charlottetown its unanimous request for the discontinuance of the use of automobiles on the Sabbath day, also to bring the same before the Legislature in the event of any legislation being proposed anent the use of automobiles, namely:—Messrs T. F. Fullerton, R. G. Strathie and R. G. Sinclair.

Permission was given to the congregation of Covehead to sell manse and glebe property there, the proceeds to be used in building a new manse.

Leave was granted to the congregation of Covehead to sell glebe of public intimation was given, and this edict was closed with the benediction.

Same place and date and at the hour of half-past two in the afternoon, Presbytery met pursuant to adjournment and was constituted by the moderator pro tempore, Mr. W. H. Spencer, sederunt ut supra. The moderator appointed Messrs R. G. Strathie and W. A. Mason to examine the session records of T. F. Fullerton and E. Sinclair.

Dr. D. N. McPhail being present was invited to sit and correspond.

Rev. Robert Laird, M. A. was nominated for the chair of Church History and Practical Theology in the Presbyterian College, Halifax.

Dr. Mowat was re-nominated moderator of the forthcoming General Assembly.

By consent of Presbytery, the following motion anent Church Union was ordered to take second place on the ticket at next quarterly meeting.

That the Presbytery, while thankfully acknowledging the benefits that the denominations interested have received from the conferences held on the subject of union, would humbly suggest that it is inexpedient to incur further expense by protracting negotiations owing to the manifest division of opinion in the church.

Mr. R. G. Sinclair resigned the moderatorship of Georgetown Session and Mr. T. F. Fullerton was appointed in his place.

Messrs T. F. Fullerton, W. H. Spencer, S. D. McPhee and T. C. James were appointed a committee to visit the congregations of Souris, Dundas, Cardigan, Georgetown, and Montague, with a view to such re-construction as is possible.

The following were appointed commissioners to the General Assembly by rotation, Messrs E. Smith, A. D. Sterling, S. D. McPhee; by election: Geo. Millar, W. A. McKay, John Hawley, ministers; William Laird, Rev. H. East, T. H. Bonshaw, Mount Stewart, Dundas, Murray Harbor North, Murray Harbor South, Caledonia, \$6 each; East St. Peter's, Georgetown, Covehead, Orwell, Richmond Bay West, \$7 each; Cardigan, Alberton, \$8 each; Cavendish, Fyvie, Strathalbyn, Montague, Souris, Bloomfield, \$9 each; Giffon, Bedouque, Valleyfield, \$10 each; Kensington, Belfast, \$18 each; Prince-ton, \$16; Summerside, St. James and Zion, Charlottetown, \$17 each.

It was agreed that Presbytery apply to the Home Mission Board, on behalf of the congregation of Richmond Bay West, for the service of a catechist during the ensuing summer; also that application be made in behalf of Marshallfield for the grant of \$300 for another year, if necessary; and further that application be made for a grant of \$100 for visitation at the Poorhouse and Falconwood.

It was decided to apply for the following grants from the augmentation fund along with those already asked for: for Richmond Bay East, \$250; Dundas \$100; Murray Harbor North \$100; Murray Harbor South \$50; Caledonia \$100. Mr. A. Crais read his report as Chaplain to the P. E. I. Hospital. On motion the report was received and adopted, and was necessary that congregations be asked to bear the ordinary expenses of the schools in order that the schools be encouraged to give their contributions to the missionary schemes.

That the Sabbath School committees be instructed to put themselves in touch with the different schools of Presbytery, by circulars or otherwise, at the opening of the schools in May, pointing out the importance of the work, and rendering that assistance they can all expenses not to exceed six dollars, to be borne by Presbytery Fund.

Mr. R. G. Sinclair presented the report on Church Life and Work, which was received and adopted, and the convener thanked for his work.

Mr. A. Crais read the report on statistics which was received and adopted, and the convener thanked for his diligence.

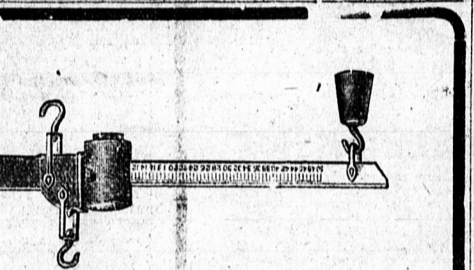

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Synopsis of Canadian North-West

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 20, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section 160 acres, more or less.

Applications for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Land Agency or Subagency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father or mother, son, daughter brother or sister of any intending homesteader. The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans.

(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if so desired perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father deceased) of homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him not less than eighty (80) acres in extent in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father or mother.

(4) The term "vicinity in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowance crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents and on a farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for return.
