these negotiations in London. There were, however, additional "clarification" negotiations being carried on in Washington.

A British proposal providing for limitation of capital ship figures to a five-year period and for invitation to the conference of Germany and other powers was before the conference tonight. Solution of the deadlock will depend upon whether the Americans, French and Italians decide to accept this proposal.

## U. S. Stand Unchanged

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Franco-American deadlock over the size of future battleships today suspended London naval conference deliberation on this question while the two nations resorted to extraordinary diplomatic conversations on the side.

Despite trans-Atlantic manoeuvring, however, the demand by France that capital ships be limited to 27,500 tons ran head-on into an apparently uncompromising United States refusal to budge much if any below existing 35,000 ton limits.

The French Ambassador to Washington, Andre de Laboulaye, acting on instructions from his government, appealed directly to the State Department for a change in the American stand for adherence to the Washington treaty limits.

While no definite, official, American reply was made public, observers here attached considerable significance to Secretary of State Hull's observation at his press conference that this government's attitude in the past is well known.

The acting Secretary of the Navy, Henry L. Roosevelt, told newsmen: "We still think the 35,000-ton battleship is necessary for our requirements."

## Beavers Defeat All Stars 3-1

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) SAINT JOHN, N. B., Feb. 19.—Breaking two previous deadlocks, Saint John Beavers defeated York All-Stars 3-1 tonight and will carry the two-goal lead into a final game at Fredericton tomorrow night, with the Southern New Brunswick hockey league title at stake.

The series was originally a best two out of three affair but after the first two games ended in 1-1 ties it was decided to make the next two a total goal contest. The winners will meet Edmundston Eskimos in the next round of the provincial playdowns.

The newly-discovered plot stood a particularly good chance of success because Halle Selassie makes most of his longer trips by air, it was pointed out.

Unconfirmed reports received here said Capt. Aljander, a delirious 28 year old United States citizen and Cuban revolutionary leader who joined the Ethiopian forces early in the war, had been captured by the Italians last week near Makale.

While the government here admitted there had been a series of "clashes" south of Makale last week, it said it had not yet received word of any major battle.

## Alleged Bribery In Purchase Of C.G.S. "Margaret"

### Amazing Story Involving Unnamed Ottawa Official Related At U. S. Munitions Inquiry.

(By Richard L. Turner) (Associated Press Staff Writer) (A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—A complex opera of graft and bribery in buying the Canadian cutter "Margaret" for Brazilian revolutionaries today convulsed the United States Senate munitions committee, but ended with two of the conspirators falling out and branding each other "grafter" and "liar."

A star witness was Frederick S. Zimmerman, naturalized German, bold, bulging, and jovial, who conceded he had sold ships to "everybody from governments to bootleggers," including one group of rum-runners who "turned out to be Cuban rebels."

One of the targets of his testimony was a diminutive Spaniard, Jose Cunill de Figueroa, who was charged by Zimmerman with pocketing \$20,000 which was intended to be the "cut" of other parties who finally passed the lie in a heated interchange before the committee table.

In the background of today's testimony were Dr. M. J. Ferrera, United States representative of the Brazilian rebels of 1932; his associate, Leigh Wade soldier of fortune; M. P. Brown, paymaster for a syndicate supplying arms to the Brazilian revolutionists, and Frank S. Jonas, w.i. o' the wisp arms agent.

The story briefly: The gun-running ring wanted a ship to carry arms to Brazil; Zimmerman and de Figueroa went to Canada to buy a boat from the Canadian government; to its cost of \$10,000 they added \$1,000 for an alleged bribe to an official in Ottawa and \$30,000 to "take care of all six at \$5,000 each."

Zimmerman deduced his commission and turned the remainder over to de Figueroa for distribution to others of the ring, but what became of it was still somewhat of a mystery when the day's testimony was over. The ship, registered under the name of a German friend of Zimmerman, was to avoid naval vessels, ultimately became the property of the Brazilian government.

At the outset, Zimmerman, who laughed as heartily as anyone at the prospect of carrying arms to Brazil, de Figueroa "had a thorough understanding of the cost of the ship to proceed, which was \$50,000 each for themselves and each for the others. There was a burst of laughter.

"Well, that's fair, isn't it?" Zimmerman asked. "I always like to make some money for someone else, that's the way you build up a business."

Together, the bulky plect Teuton and the fiery, energetic Spaniard went to Halifax to inspect the ship, found it to their liking, and repaired to Ottawa to submit a bid, with a stop at Montreal to pick up \$6,000 sent by de Ferrera as a deposit.

"I sold a certain gentleman that if I got the boat he would get \$1,000," Zimmerman said in describing the actual transaction.

"This was a representative of the Canadian government?" asked Senator Clark (D. Mo.).

"Yes. He didn't ask for it, but he asked to do these things if you want to get things done quickly."

At this point chairman Nye interrupted the proceedings to reprimand Zimmerman that honesty of his officials "be careful in alleging that Zimmerman had made money."

"Did you pay that money to that official," Nye then asked sharply. Zimmerman, for a moment, became serious, and went on: "Of course I did, he didn't ask me. I did it as a courtesy." Here again he was interrupted by the laughter of spectators. I did it as a courtesy to him for expediting the transaction."

Zimmerman again emphasized that the Canadian official had not solicited the money. "He could do absolutely nothing for me except to hurry up the papers and routine," he said. "The lowest bid for the ship was \$10,000 and I bid \$18,000."

They got the ship for \$18,000. De Figueroa telephoned Ferrera at New York and informed him the price was \$50,000, leaving them in

Finance Minister Dunning said he had asked all Ministers to try to carry on the public services under their direction for the least possible money. If that was orthodox economy he was orthodox. He believed it his duty to the taxpayers of the country to do so.

"I am sure," said Mr. Dunning, "the Minister (Mr. Euler) was convinced there would be no deterioration in the service as a result of this reduction although his reasons are confidential and cannot be divulged. This is a simple matter of Canadian concern and does not relate itself either to the rising power of Japan or to a world war."

## Atlantic Subsidies Cut

Cuts in the shipping subsidies on both Atlantic and Pacific coasts first drew the fire of Hon. C. H. Cahan (Cons. St. Lawrence-St. George, Montreal). The Atlantic cut was \$250,000.

Replying to Mr. Cahan, Mr. Euler said he was not much afraid of any curtailment in service. Mr. Cahan retorted Mr. Euler was not as astute as he usually was if he did not make further inquiry. His opinion was that the cuts might render the whole service inefficient.

The cut in the Pacific subsidy was a kind of economy which would not be worth much, said Mr. McGeer.

## Mr. McGeer Disgusted

"If that is the kind of economy we are going to adopt in order to balance the budget," he said, "we are going to have a balanced budget at the expense of the Canadian people, at the expense of the expansion of Canadian trade and at the expense of institutional services which are competing with services in other countries which receive liberal assistance from their Governments."

The budget would not be balanced in this way, Mr. McGeer predicted, although Canadian companies and workmen would suffer.
