Huge Forest Fire Raging In Nfld.

(By The Canadian Press) GRAND FALLS, Nfld., July 31—A forest fire was raging tonight through vast stands of timber owned by the Reid Newfoundland Development Company in this Central Newfoundland area with hundreds of lumbermen and every available piece of fire apparatus fighting it. The flaming area was made up of three great fires which merged after starting earlier in the week. Rain which fell Tuesday night was not heavy enough to be more than a slight check on the blaze. Meanwhile, two men were convicted and sentenced to 12 months imprisonment for deliberately starting a fire which cost the Reid Company \$30,000 before it was extinguished. Evidence brought against the pair was that they started the fire by placing a lighted candle in inflammable scrub because they were unable to obtain employment with the company.

Less Beans, Corn, Peas And Tomatoes Planted
