Tunisian Reaches Port With the Contingent and 150 South African Invalids—Fifteen Men Accidentally Left—Col. Pellat Speaks of Men's Good Conduct—Some Minor Complaints—Halifax School of Mines.

CORONATION CONTINGENT ARRIVES.
QUEBEC, July 12.—(Special).—The S. S. Tunisian with the returning Contingent reached port this morning.
There were also on board 150 returning South African invalids.
Fifteen or 20 of the Contingent were accidentally left behind.
OFFICERS EXPRESS SATISFACTION.
Col. Pellat expresses satisfaction with the conduct of his men and with their reception on the other side.
The officers deny that the men had any

cause of complaint against the Imperial Authorities.

LORD KITCHENER'S RETURN HE RECEIVES AN OVATION

Proceedings at Southampton—Praises His Men—Triumphal Progress Through London—Prince of Wales and Other Notables Greet Him Heartily—Reception Such as London has Seldom Seen—French and Hamilton Honored.

KITCHENER REACHES SOUTHAMPTON.
LONDON, July 12.—(Special).—Lord Kitchener arrived at Southampton at 9.15.
After a brief official reception, he was driven to Hartley Hall where he received an address from the Chamber of Commerce.
PRAISES RANK AND FILE.
Lord Kitchener declared his success in the war was due to the rank and file of the army.
KITCHENER IN LONDON.
Kitchener reached London at 12.45.
His progress through the streets was most triumphant, as the crowd there saw

and cheered him.
A ROYAL HANDSHAKING.
The Prince of Wales, Duke of Connaught and other notables were at the station and the Prince shook the general by the hand.
SPLENDID OVATION TO KITCHENER.
The whole march through the streets to St. James Palace was such an ovation as London had not had in any other war celebrations.
FRENCH AND HAMILTON CALLED FOR.
Generals' French and Hamilton also spoke in response to clamorous calls.
