The Guardian was Saturday shown some stalks of tobacco grown by R. L. Day, York, and for which he was awarded prizes at the Provincial Exhibition. The stalks measured over seven feet in length, had perfect leaves thickly borne along the stem and the plant was in every way healthy and vigorous looking. Mr. Day has been in the province only two years, having immigrated from England, and he has already "caught on" to the most profitable lines of agriculture here. His experiment with tobacco has been very successful. He finds it can be grown as easily and cheaply as oats or potatoes while the returns from it is many times greater. There is an unlimited market for tobacco plant right here in Charlottetown where it can be manufactured as well as anywhere else in Canada. There is money in growing it and it will pay farmers to look into it and prepare to grow it.

OTTAWA, Sept. 26—Timothy O'Dea of Ottawa, has sent a letter to the Toronto Telegram, in which he makes some pointed references to the Rev. A. E. Burke. He writes: "Sir—As a reader of your breezy newspaper, I was delighted to note your account of the return of the very Reverend Dr. A. E. Burke once more to the scene of his former activity. To be sure, you are hard on him sometimes, but he gets back at you, for as a writer and a champion of Catholicism he has no equal since the days of Father Tom Burke (his first cousin I am told). "One thing you were short on is in not giving Dr. Burke credit for bringing out the new Ruthenian Bishop—of course, you mention it, but you forget to credit him with it. "I see by the cables he gets from Rome that he is right at home in the Vatican, and has the ear of the Holy Father, which is more than the rest of the reverend gentlemen of the Toronto diocese have, and this is said to be the cause of the jealousy which rankles in their breasts, though I don't believe it. "Dr. Burke, it is claimed has built a whole slew of churches in the Northwest and given them to the people free of debt and charge of any kind. He has blessed the C. P. R., chapel, tobacco and boomed the outfit. He ought, considering the cordiality existing between him and the president, who always consults him on all kinds of railway and business matters. If Dr. Burke was anywhere else outside of Toronto he would be honored and get a mitre and crozier, but as it is he gets nothing but the side step where he ought to have honors paid him. "Take him as a man of courage in declaring himself as a Tory in Toronto, where nearly all his congregation are of the Grit herd. Then his labors on behalf of the Prince Edward Island tunnel seem to be forgotten, though many's the journey he made to Ottawa at his own expense. "Talk about your McNeills and Fallons till you're black in the face, but there's no man on the ecclesiastical carpet like Dr. Burke. Why after the way he has praised the anti-Home Ruler, the Duke of Norfolk, I would not be surprised if the Duke has not got a mitre ordered for him. True for you it will take a lot of material, but the Duke is rich and loves a man after his own heart, and parties early an unselfish and modest one."
