The pall-bearers were: Messrs. C. C. Gardner, Frank Heartz, A. R. McKay, J. B. Dinna, Miller Mathieson and John Andrews. Rev. T. W. Murphy officiated.

**WEDDING BELLS.**—The Pictou Advocate says:—Two young people well known in the West Branch district were quietly married Wednesday morning by Rev. Mr. Archibald, Mr. Walter D. McKenzie, son of Mr. Wm. McKenzie, Loganville, was the groomsmen who claimed for his bride Miss Helen Isabel Murray, daughter of Mr. Jno. K. Murray, of West Branch. **THE LATE POPE.**—Yesterday in the Pro-Cathedral, Rev. Father J. G. McLellan, parish priest, made reference to the death of the late Pontiff Plus-X. He eloquently reviewed the life and great work of the 258th successor to St. Peter, who, he said, had worthily filled his supremely important and sacred office. Afterwards, on Father McLellan's invitation the whole congregation knelt in special prayer for his late Holiness. On Thursday morning next at 10 o'clock, in the Pro-Cathedral a Pontifical High Mass of Requiem will be celebrated for the repose of the late Pope Plus.

**SUMMERSIDE, Aug. 23.**—A sad accident occurred in Summerside Harbor on Saturday evening last when William Howatt, aged 18 years, of St. John, an employe admitting to the works at Carleton, lost his life. The tug J. O. Grant was towing a scow into Summerside, and when inside the Black Buoy, at the entrance to the harbor, the tow line in some way became caught on the corner of the scow. The deceased released it with a handspike. In recalling the line caught the young man throwing him overboard. Every effort was made to save him but in vain. The tug proceeded to Summerside where the accident was reported, and Mr. Miller, head of the contracting firm, remained to superintend searching operations. The search was continued all day to-day but without success. Search will be resumed tomorrow.

Friday night's meeting of Victoria Division was as usual most interesting. After the initiation of four new members and installation of officers to fill vacancies, the Good of the Order programmes followed. Brother S. F. Tarbush gave an account of his experiences on the mainland, especially in Halifax in war times, and recounted some exciting experiences. Brother Jas. Brodie reported as delegate to the National Division which met at Rhode Island U. S. speaking in detail of the proceedings, of which was the largest and most progressive session held for many years. The G. W. P. Brother L. P. Tanton gave a full account of the meeting of the Grand Division at Hartsville showing steady progress and increase of membership. The W. P. Brother Andrew McNair, made one of the pleasant addresses of welcome to the new members, and of compliment and encouragement at the interested manifested by all our members in Division work.

The fact that one officer's chair and five other seats were vacant, caused by six of our plucky members volunteering, some for Sydney and some for overseas service, was a subject for serious comment, showing how far reaching the war plague is. The following resolution was unanimously adopted by a standing vote:—

"Whereas six of our Victoria Division members have volunteered and left our shores to join in defence of our country in the war against the forces of the enemy; and in view of our admiration of their courage and loyalty, commending them to the Divine Father's gracious guidance and protection, with this fervent prayer, that He will lead them, with unclouded minds and courageous hearts to win places of honour amongst Britain's valiant and victorious heroes; and that He will restore them in safety to their homes, conscious in the assurance of duty to King and Country well and faithfully performed."

**TUESDAY.**

**THE MORWENNA.**—The S. S. Morwenna, which sailed last evening from Charlottetown for St. John's, Newfoundland via Sydney, N. S., had on board a large and various cargo, consisting principally of 2,000 bags of oats, 50 boxes of cheese, 50 cases of eggs and 400 packages of vegetables. On deck there were 50 head of cattle, 3 horses and 50 sheep.

**GAZETTED.**—In Saturday's issue of the Canada Gazette, among the militia announcements is that as to the confirmation in rank of Lieut. K. S. Rogers, (Charlottetown) of the Canadian Signalling Corps, the appointment dating from July 3rd, and also the announcement of the promotion of Lieut. J. McMillan, of the Abegweit Light Infantry, to be Captain, vice Capt. M. A. Shaw, resigned.

**FURTHER PARTICULARS.**—Dr. Samuel Nicholson, a native of Dundas, P. E. I., died very suddenly in his home in Bradford Massachusetts, last week. The remains were taken to the Island accompanied by the widow of the deceased and a member of the Masonic body. The funeral, which was held at Dundas on Saturday morning, was one of the largest seen in that section of the country. The services were conducted by Rev. M. N. McLeod, assisted by Rev. Mr. McIntosh of Souris and Rev. Mr. Rand of East Point. There were many beautiful floral tributes. The deceased, who was only forty years of age, was a son of Mr. John Nicholson and leaves a widow and one child to mourn.

**IMPROVED LIGHTING.**—A great improvement in the lighting of the Provincial Building is being carried out. Formerly only partially lighted by electricity and principally by gas, the building is now to be entirely electrically lighted. The work is well advanced. The improvement the change effects is already apparent. Some handsome lamps not only brilliantly light the long corridors, but are a decided ornament in the general appearance. The Provincial Dept. of Public Works, which looks after the maintenance of Provincial buildings and property, is to be commended upon the lighting improvement that is being made in this building.

**FOX COMPANIES.**—At the last meeting of the Executive Council, supplementary letters patent were granted for the increase of the capital stock of the "Royal Black Silver Fox Co., Ltd." from \$240,000 to \$500,000, and of "The Royal Silver Fox Co., Ltd." from \$25,000 to \$195,000. Letters were granted at the same meeting for the incorporation of the "Kinsmore Silver Black and Silver Fox Co., Ltd." with its head office at Charlottetown and a capital stock of \$50,000, and the "Silver Horn-Gunnar Black Fox Co., Ltd." with a capital stock of \$75,000, and its head office in Summerside. Another new fox company is in process of formation in Summerside. It is to be called the "Imperial Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd." is to have a capital stock of \$125,000, divided into 5,000 shares of the value of \$25 each. The head office of the company will be located in Summerside.
