This organization held its fourth session with the North River church on Thursday August 16. Notwithstanding the very busy season there was a good attendance at the afternoon meeting and a large audience in the evening.

The afternoon meeting opened with prayers by Rev. D. B. McLeod and Deacon Jacob Bain. The roll call of schools indicated that in this district there are fourteen Sunday Schools, four Baptist, four Methodist, three Presbyterian, and three Church of Scotland. The reports so far as given, were generally of a favorable character. A good part of the meeting was occupied by the Field Secretary, Rev. G. P. Raymond who stated that the whole Province is now organized for interdenominational at Sunday School work. Every District has had at least one meeting and by the first of September every district will have had two or more meetings. The speaker took the ground that when proper efforts are made all of these schools will be kept open the year round.

In the evening devotional exercises were led by the President Hugh McMillan Esq. The following officers were elected for the coming year: President Jacob Bain of the North River Baptist; Vice President, Hector Murchison of the Clyde River Presbyterian; Secretary and Treasurer, Miss Hannah Crosby of the Cornwall Methodist. Executive Committee to act with the officers, Rev. W. B. Thomas, Rev. J. G. McIvor, and Rev. A. F. Browne. The speakers were Rev. D. B. McLeod, Rev. W. B. Thomas and Rev. G. P. Raymond. Mr. McLeod gave an earnest and thoughtful plea for a careful and thorough study of God's word. This study is not enjoyed as it should be largely because of want of method. Study the Bible with a definite end in view and the beauties of the word will be brought out in a manner to encourage and comfort and that end the glory of Jesus, and the knowledge of His Salvation. Mr. Raymond also spoke on the word claiming that Christ is always present in the blessed Book and those who search in the right Spirit will always find Him. The speaker rendered a solo in a very fine manner and there was excellent singing by the choir of the North River church. All were united in feeling that the meetings were in every respect enjoyable and profitable.
