Word of the sudden death in Hinkley, Leicestershire, England, on Saturday, November 5, of Dr. Harry Munn Godfrey, F.R.C.S., in his 59th year was received with much regret by his friends and relatives here. Born at Suffolk, P.E.I., on January 15, 1891, eldest son of the late William Henry Godfrey, and the late Elizabeth Munn Godfrey, he moved to Marshfield with his parents about 1902. He received his early education at school in Suffolk and at the late Mrs. Hawley of Marshfield. He attended Dalhousie University, graduating in medicine in 1914. The same year he received his commission in the (British) Royal Army Medical Corps and proceeded overseas with the rank of Captain and served with distinction in Italy, Belgium and France. On furlough in 1917 he married Nursing Lieutenant Margaret Watson Hawley, daughter of the late Reverend and late Mrs. Hawley of Marshfield. Dr. and Mrs. Godfrey returned overseas where he again served until severely wounded in October 1918 shortly before the Armistice. He used his long convalescence for intensive medical studies and graduated from the University of Edinburgh with their highest degree in Surgery. Dr. Godfrey served on the staff of several hospitals in the British Isles, and later, his recovery complete, entered private practice at Hinkley, Leicestershire, where he specialized in surgery until his sudden death.

Well known in Prince Edward Island, Harry visited his old home a number of times during a month with his late mother at Marshfield in 1946. Of a kindly and sentimental nature he derived great pleasure from chatting with boyhood friends and in strolling with his thoughts to the pastimes of a childhood and was looking forward to another visit next year. His sudden demise is sincerely regretted by all who knew him. He leaves to mourn besides his wife, two brothers, Clifford, manager of the Bank of Montreal, Toronto, N. S., Rupert on the old home at Marshfield, and one sister Jean (Mrs. A. A. MacBeath) also of Marshfield. Another brother J. Wilfrid Godfrey, K. C. of Halifax, N. S., passed away in February last.

AMHERST, N. S., Nov. 8. (CP) - Farmer B. L. Burge, King's County member of the Prince Edward Island Legislature, is the 1949 Maritime potato king. Mr. Burge was announced grand champion of the potato division at the Maritime Winter Fair here today and received \$125 donated by Canadian Industries Ltd. He grew his prize-winning potatoes on his 80-acre farm, which has been operated by his family for five generations. He grows an average of 12 acres of potatoes each year and credits his success to keeping up the fertility of his soil. The 51-year-old potato king uses a 5-10-13 chemical fertilizer mixture and applies it to the potatoes, and a timothy, thus keeping the potatoes in good supply for the four-year rotation of potatoes, oats, clover and timothy. Mr. Burge, who has been operating the family farm for 37 years, also operates a potato warehouse.

Mr. Reginald Mellish, New Perth, was Maritime Reserve Championship winner with his entry of Green Mountains, Mr. Burge, with Katadins, and Mr. Mellish placed one and two respectively in the competition for the P. E. I. Championship. Special prizes were awarded to

A new schedule of fees for motor vehicles and new weight regulations for trucks and trailers in Prince Edward Island, have been approved by the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council under the provisions of the Highway Traffic Act, and will become effective on January 1, 1950, it was announced yesterday by Hon. J. Wilfrid Arsenault, Provincial Secretary. The new schedule simplifies registration since the tax is based on the weight of the truck unladen rather than the weight of the vehicle and load to be carried as heretofore. In many cases, under the old system, the weights to be carried were under-estimated. Under the new rates the tax will be approximately the same as before if, generally speaking, the truck had been registered for the weight it actually carried. Formerly the only load restriction was the gross weight for which the vehicle was registered, except at those times in the Spring when weight limitations were placed in effect by order of the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council. Under the new system trucks must not have a greater gross weight than that specified for that particular type of truck. The weight allowed varies with the wheelbase and the number of axles. Prince Edward Island, which was the first Province in Canada to create an all-embracing Federation of Fishermen, is again first in establishing the panel discussion method of airing fisheries problems. This method will be used again within a few days in New Brunswick and, if satisfactory there, will set the pattern for the East Coast. Fisheries Council meeting in Toronto on February, declared Mr. Clive Planta, manager of the Fisheries Council of Canada, yesterday afternoon. Stating the panel discussion to have been a "great success," Mr. Planta congratulated the chairman, Prof. Frank MacKinnon, on an "excellent job" and the other members of the panel for a "fine performance." A prominent citizen passed away yesterday in the person of City Councillor Peter E. Holland (above). Death occurred at his home, 14 Prince Street after an illness of several months. Born at Woutton, Mass., on June 22, 1872, he died on November 10, 1948, he was appointed freight agent at Charlottetown, retiring on pension on June 30, 1947. On February 10, 1948, he was elected Councillor for Ward One at the civic elections. After his election, he was appointed chairman of the Fire Committee, Provisional, and served several terms as Town Councillor in Souris and was for two terms Mayor of that municipality. Mr. Holland was a member of the Prince Edward Island Temperance Commission, having been named to that post when it came into being on April 8, 1948. He was particularly well known, especially in Charlottetown and the eastern section of the Province where he had lived the greater part of his life. His friends were legion because of his fine personality and readiness to co-operate in every worthwhile endeavour. Every deserving cause had his wholehearted support, and he discharged all his public duties well and faithfully. He was a valued member of St. Dunstan's Basilica Holy Name Society, the Charlottetown Council of the Knights of Columbus and the Benevolent Irish Society. The late Mr. Holland was twice married. His first wife was the late Agnes MacCormac, Launceston. Several years after her death he married Catherine Beaton, East Point, who survives him. Surviving members of the first family are Anne (Mrs. Andrew MacLean, Trenton, N.S.) and Joseph, Toronto. Two daughters, Mary and Mae, are dead, and one son, Lieut. Thomas Holland of the Royal Canadian Navy was killed in service in World War II. All members of the second family survive: They are Beatrice, (Mrs. Frances White, Rollo Bay); Henry, with Trans Canada Air Lines in Newfoundland, and Charles, at the Jesuit Novitiate, Capella. On the family with the exception of Joseph were at home when Mr. Holland passed away.

Hyndman, of Montreal, to Mr. Robert Gordon Shaw son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Shaw of Brackley Beach, P.E.I., took place quietly on Saturday afternoon, November 5, in the chapel of the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul at three o'clock. The Rev. R. J. Berlis performed the ceremony, with Mr. K. Meek at the organ. Pink and white carnations carried out the floral decorations. Given away by her father, the bride wore a crepe afternoon dress in heaven blue shade, a black felt hat with blue ribbon trim and black accessories while she carried a Colonial bouquet of Joanna Hill roses and bouvardia. The matron of honor was Mrs. C. Edward Ross, cousin of the bride, in a ralsin colored crepe and satin afternoon dress with grey accessories and carrying a Colonial bouquet of pink dot baby poms. Mr. Ernest N. Shaw, of Toronto, was his brother's best man. The ushers were Mr. Dirck Hyndman, brother of the bride, and Mr. David Hyndman, her cousin. Following a small reception in

the Ritz-Carlton, the bridal couple left on a motor trip, after which they will take up residence in Prince Edward Island. (Montreal Star)
