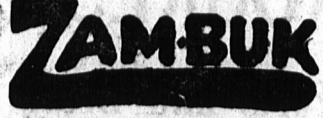

THE DAIRY SITUATION

Sir, A letter appeared in your paper yesterday signed by R. E. Spillett on "The Dairy Situation" in which he attempts to attach all the responsibility for the defects in our cheese upon us as makers.

I as one man willing to assume my share and am also prepared to work with the directors of the factory, the patrons, buyers and inspectors, are equally responsible, and I can hardly understand why Mr. Spillett or anybody else who should have the welfare of the farmers at heart, should attempt to put a damper on our efforts.

That the patrons may know Mr. Spillett's views on these matters in January last, I would like you to publish the following questions submitted to him, and his answers, as read at our Dairy Conference in Charlottetown, a copy of which is in the possession of every maker in the Island.

"1. Do you consider the buildings and equipment of the several cheese manufacturing companies up to the standard, from a sanitary standpoint, that they were when the business was started in the Province?"

"Mr. Spillett: No. The trouble is principally due to the faulty floors and gutters, and consequent leakage of whey, and washings getting underneath, also leaky conductors to the vats, and the surroundings becoming unclean. Many of the vats are getting too old, in fact the woodwork of some is in use is rotten and the pans leaking. Should be condemned."

"2. From your past experience from personal observation of late years, do you consider the cans used by patrons to deliver milk to the cheese factories are up to the standard they were when the business started?"

"Mr. Spillett: No. Of course when dairying started here the cans were all practically new, some of which are still in use over twenty years. Notwithstanding this fact I believe the flavor of our cheese is just as good as then, but with a lot of the old rusted and broken cans discarded it should help to improve the quality, and keep up with the times."

"3. From your experience as a maker and handler of cheese, in your opinion (a) Do you consider the milk as being delivered to the factories in as good condition as it should be for the manufacture of finest cheese?"

"Mr. Spillett: In general I do but there are many exceptions. One can of over ripe milk will spoil a whole vat of good milk, so that great care is necessary on the part of every producer to see that the milk is sent sweet and clean."
(b) Do you consider the cheese makers at all times exercise the care they should in keeping their factories and surroundings in the best possible condition under the existing circumstances?"

"Mr. Spillett: No. The old time

efforts on the part of the maker to try and excel seems to have been lost sight of largely due to the fact that help and other expenses have increased to such an extent that the makers' net profits at the end of the season are very discouraging.

(c) Do you consider the cheese makers handle the milk they receive in the best manner possible, or to the best of their ability from the experience they have had and the instructions they receive?"

"Mr. Spillett: In many cases no. As I have stated before that ambition to excel appears to have died out, and anything good enough to pass the buyer has taken its place."

(4) Do you consider a greater interest on the part of the Boards of Directors of the different companies in regard to the building and equipment, the patron and cheese maker putting into practice the information they already possess in regard to the caring for the milk, and handling it in the factories, would be the means of turning out a finer quality of cheese in the Province than at present?"

"Mr. Spillett: Yes. But I think it is the lack of general interest on the part of the producers that is behind the whole trouble and this is largely due to the lack of efficient organization and either the local or federal departments will have to come to the aid of the producer."

"5. If No. 4 is answered in the affirmative, would you consider it advisable to have legislation such as the licensing of cheese factories, and cheese makers to have the points mentioned carried into effect?"

"Mr. Spillett: Yes, I think so. I understand in at least some sections of the West this licensing system has been introduced, and information could be secured that would guide us."

"6. Do you consider the present system of inspection of cheese as practiced by the buyers tends to make the work of the factory instructor as effective as it should be?"

"Mr. Spillett: No. I am satisfied that cheese taken from the factory without being properly inspected by the buyers tends to carelessness and an interest suffered as a consequence."

It will be seen at that time Mr. Spillett placed the responsibility on all connected with the business, himself included, as shown by his answer to Question No. 6. Why try to place it now entirely on the makers and at the same time attempt to make it more difficult to get the milk delivered in the condition it should be?"

I think in justice to all parties and in the interest of the future of our dairy industry, the Dairy Association should see that the information submitted to the Dairy Conference should be placed in the hands of every patron. We as makers already have it.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must ap-pear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency office. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of the homestead on a farm or at least 80 acres of certain conditions. A habitable house is re-quired except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section on along side his homestead. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in cer-tain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years; cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W.
