**Canadian Fox Men Gather in S'side**

Every province in Canada except Alberta and British Columbia were represented at the fourth annual meeting of the Canadian Silver Fox Breeders Association held in Summerside on Wednesday.  
 It was the largest and most enthusiastic gathering of silver fox breeders ever held in Canada their being over two hundred present. The meeting occupied the entire day and matters of great importance to the welfare of the Silver Fox industry were arrived at, included in which were several amendments to the constitution.  
 Messrs C. T. Munroe, Petticoe, N. B., and McGill, Burrough, of Quebec were elected on the Board of Directors. The three retiring P. E. I. directors Messrs G. Shelton Sharp, B. Graham Rogers and W. K. McGougan were re-elected. At the Directors meeting following, Mr. J. A. Webster was re-elected President.  
 The meeting was honored by the presence of Mr. C. M. McRae, acting Live Stock commissioner, and Mr. J. W. Braut, accountant Canadian National Live Stock Records. Others present were Mr. M. MacKenzie, Mr. G. W. Gillis, Mr. J. S. MacLeod, and Mr. C. K. Walton, Secretary of the Ontario Branch of the Canadian Silver Fox Breeders Association as well as a number of prominent visitors from New Brunswick.  
 At the directors meeting immediately following the annual meeting it was decided that the Association give two World Champion Cups for competition at the next Royal Show.
