Accidents on C. N. R. During February

OTTAWA, Mar. 9—Accidents on Canadian railways during the month of February as reported to the Dominion Railway Commission numbers 326, 146 people being killed and 225 injured. One passenger was killed and 33 injured, 10 employees killed and 203 injured. Five other persons killed and 19 injured made up the total.
