—SWIMS SUMMERSIDE HARBOR.—A swim of two miles, in rough waters, across the harbor at Summerside, was a remarkable performance on Wednesday night of a horse belonging to Mr. Robert Phillips. On Wednesday Mr. Phillips took his mare and cart by scow across to McCallum's point, where he is engaged in quarrying stone. He returned to Summerside in the evening, leaving the mare over at the point. Some hours afterwards, just at dark, a resident on the west end of the town saw what he took to be a boat coming ashore near the western town limit. The object, however, proved to be Mr. Phillips' mare, taking the short cut for home. She landed in the mud at the mouth of the creek at the extreme western end of Water Street and there got bogged down, being somewhat exhausted from her long swim and buffeted by the waves but, after having been extricated from the mud and assisted to a good footing the gallant mare shook herself and appeared to be not a penny the worse.

## Tsingtao's New Governor Dismissed 147 Officials

TSINGTAO, China, June 13.—Governor Kao En-hung's "big stick" regime which began recently with the dismissal of 147 department officials and advisers, gives promise of further interesting days in Tsingtao's tenally placid existence. Having pacified the police, who were on the verge of mutiny because of three months arrears of pay, the new governor and his staff are on the alert for threatened counter attacks by the ousted ones.

The historic administration building, over which the flags of Germany, Japan and China have floated, never witnessed a more exciting day than that of the recent political house-cleaning. Governor Kao began operations at 8 a.m., an unheard of thing, and the dismissed employes left swearing all sorts of vengeance. The erstwhile director of general affairs, who was the ring leader in the sallies upon the public treasury, admitted to the new administration that there was not a copper to turn over and refused to surrender his records and files. He succeeded in slipping out of the city after having once been stopped by the police.

After the police had been paid their arrears of salary, the governor was astounded to receive word that the police chief had resigned. Investigation showing that he had been bribed by a wealthy Chinese, who had made a fortune in illicit opium trade, and who wanted to block any inquiry. The governor gave him a limited time to which to remove themselves from his jurisdiction.

## Rotarians Meet In Toronto

TORONTO, Ont., June 13.—Representing some 25 countries, with approximately 1800 clubs, over 10,000 Rotarians will register at convention headquarters here for the 15th annual convention of Rotary International, which will open at Exhibition Park on June 17. Sessions will be held morning and afternoon until closing day, Friday, June 20, when the convention will be brought to a close with a general farewell gathering, and the visitors return to their homes in all quarters of the civilized world to practice and preach the Rotary philosophy: "He profits most who serves best" and "Service above self."

The growth of the Rotary movement has been rapid and in keeping with its high ideals. The first club was formed in Chicago 25 years ago and though there are now approximately 1800 Rotary Clubs there has never been a charter surrendered or one recalled. The national association of 16 clubs was formed in 1910, the second convention being held in Portland, Oregon, in the following year. In 1912 the International Association was formed at Duluth, Minn., to provide for charter for Winnipeg, Man., and London, England. Ten years later at the Los Angeles convention the constitution was again revised and the name Rotary International adopted.

In both of membership, the British Empire takes second place to the United States, with more than 15,000 Rotarians organized in about 250 clubs in the British Isles, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Tasmania, South Africa, India and Bermuda. One hundred and fifty British clubs will be represented at the convention here.

"A philosophy of everyday living" is the definition given of "Rotary" and its aim is to inspire men to realize fully their individual capacity for 100 per cent. citizenship in their state and nation; the square deal to their employees, customers, and business or professional associates, and, individually and through their association in Rotary clubs, to bring about understanding, goodwill and international peace. A Rotary Club is described as "a group of representative business and professional men, one man from each distinct business or profession in a community." The intention is that each business shall have one worthy and active exponent in the Rotary club and that the Rotary club, through its members, may have one direct and responsible avenue of approach to all those engaged in each business and profession in the community.
