-NEW METHOD OF MARKETING HOGS-The annual meeting of the Grand River and Port Hill Shipping Clubs held on Tuesday evening in Maple Leaf Hall, Grand River was very largely attended. The meeting was presided over by the president Mr. Ings. The speakers were Mr. Elliott, manager of the Live Stock Shipping Clubs for the Maritimes and Mr. C. E. Clay of Charlottetown. Mr. Elliott gave a lengthy talk on a new system of grading hogs, that of grading and weighing then after they are dressed and not alive as has always been the custom heretofore, the farmers receiving the actual value of the pork. This system is used extensively in Denmark and has been tried out by a large packing house in Ontario with very good results. Other packing houses in Canada are considering the adoption of this method. Mr. Clay thought the idea was a good one and thought that it would meet with approval here. The suggestion was well received by those present. Up to the present time no packing houses in the Maritimes have graded their hogs this way. General co-operative marketing was discussed by both speakers. Mr. Ings was re-elected President and Mr. Edward Lark n, secretary. The report for the year showed that the business handled by the club was double that of last year and was in the vicinity of \$3,000. This report was received with enthusiasm.-S

We are also pleased to report that the young child of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. McKinnon, Peter's Road, who has been under medical care for some time, is somewhat improved, and speedy recovery now seems probable.

A large amount of this commodity has been put up by this firm during the fall and winter so far, and good prices considering "the depression" have been paid to the many patrons over a wide extended territory. A large staff of experienced and skilful hands attend to the various duties of this commodious plant. The Inspector has resided with the family of Mr. Joseph G. Jenkins, Greek River, while carrying out the official duties of Inspector in this plant.

Mr. S. S. Butler, Peter's Road, also a veteran preserver in this important industry, has been engaged to a considerable extent in this work and as usual has done a good business both for his employees and for the patronizing public.

The smelt fishing industry of our surrounding coast waters has given employment to many, but the prices realized by the shippers are too low to make the industry a paying one. Mr. Benjamin Richards, Cambridge Road, bought large quantities for export, but the enterprise did not prove a paying one this year. P.

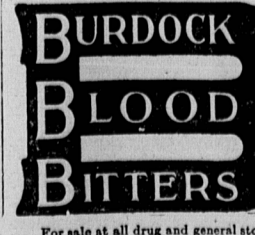

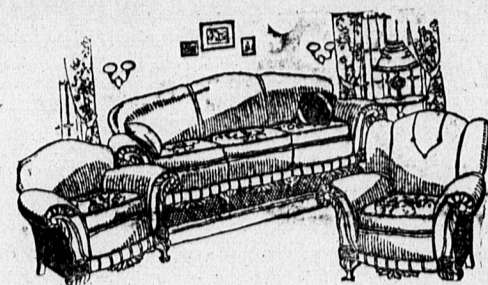
