RUSSIA AND JAPAN.

The trouble now threatening between Russia and Japan is not of recent origin. It dates back to the settlement which followed the Japan-China war of 1894-5 in which Russia intervened for her own advantage and as the pretended friend of China to deprive Japan of the legitimate fruits of her victory. The Japanese government has been since steadily preparing to have another reckoning. The big indemnity recovered from China at that time has been largely expended in new war-ships guns and munitions and in enlarging and perfecting the Japanese army on the European model.

If war now breaks out Japan will begin it, and for the like reasons which induced Kruger to invade the British provinces in South Africa—to get in a decisive blow before her enemy is ready. The Siberian railway, when completed, will enable Russia to transport troops and stores with rapidity to the Pacific coast, where at present she has a force much smaller than that which Japan can place in the field. The Japanese fleet is also much stronger than the Russian naval force in Pacific waters, for it is to be observed that Russia's formidable navy is divided into three widely separated bodies, in the Baltic, the Black Sea and the Pacific, neither of which can reinforce another except after long and difficult voyages.

Japan has cultivated friendly relations with Britain, the United States and China during recent years. It may be that her present attitude is only a feint to show Russia that it will be prudent not to intermeddle in Britain's South African affairs. But more probably Japan is in earnest. The Westminster Gazette says that "war is contagious," and "the situation in the far east is expected to eventuate in war between Russia and Japan." The Outlook in its Hong Kong correspondence predicts that "the long-expected struggle between the two powers will come off in the near future." The same correspondent adds:

Furthermore, if war is declared, Russia has no chance. Take my tip. The Japanese will win on shore easily, unless they lose their heads, and their fleet will crush the Russian. When you fight it is a great thing to believe you can win. It gives you pluck. The Japanese are not wanting in vanity.

The London Daily Mail says:—

Japan knows that her time for striking is now or in the forthcoming spring. That is to say, she must assail Russia before the completion of the trans-Siberian railway, while the hands of France are tied by the Paris exhibition. If Japan takes the opportunity the war is likely to have but one result. Russia was never more heavily handicapped, while Japan has never been better equipped. Both nations are suffering from the stringency of money but the plight of Russia is infinitely worse than that of Japan in this respect. Russians are badly provided with ships in the far East, and they have a famine to contend with. In view of the talk about Russia and France intervening in the quarrel between Britain and the Dutch African republics it is satisfactory to know that Russia is thus seriously threatened on her vulnerable eastern flank.

At latest accounts Aguinaldo and his Filipino army was in immediate prospect of being surrounded. Three generals and three armies are after him. General Wheaton is on the north side of him with a division while General McArthur on the southwest and General Lawson on the southeast are closing in. This begins to look like business. When the insurgent chief is thus surrounded he may be caught, and if once caught the war might be brought to a speedy close.

The University of New of New Brunswick has an unfortunate trouble growing out of the practice of hazing, "or initiation" as it is there called. The faculty took very severe action by expelling five of the ringleaders among the seniors and suspended fourteen other students. This punishment was

thought by many to be too severe and the Senate, or governing body of the institution, was called to consider the case. After three meetings and failing to come to an agreement with the Faculty the Senate has decided to reinstate the hazers on receiving their oral and written apologies, which have been tendered. It is now expected that three of the professors will resign, as they have threatened to do in case their notions of discipline are not carried into effect.

The Symons Family.

Referring to the late General Sir. W. P. Symons, a writer in The London Daily Mail says:—"The founder of the Symons family was one Simon de St. Sevrès, a Norman Knight, who came from Avranches, Normandy, with the army of William the Conqueror, and was rewarded for distinguished services rendered on the battle-field with several grants of land in several counties. After a while the head of the Symons family moved to South Devon—Plymouth and its neighborhood—where they intermarried with the oldest of the South Devon families, and followed the profession of arms or that of a country gentleman. Sir William was a member of the senior branch of the Symons family, who acquired land at Hatt Cornwall, at which place he was born and bred. Mr. J. G. Symons, the distinguished meteorologist, comes of the same stock.

CATS COME HIGH.

Twenty-five Dollars the Price in Dawson. Canadian Scarc in that Town.

TORONTO, Nov. 8.—J. W. Reid of Ottawa, a member of the Auditor General's Department, passed through the city Monday. He has just returned from the Yukon district, where he has been engaged all summer in making an audit of the Government accounts.

At the last census of Dawson City, taken by the mounted police, it was shown that the population of the town was about 5,000, and of that number only about 600 were Canadian citizens. Mr. Reid said that owing to the lack of Canadians, it was difficult at some times to secure a jury, there being only about 200 people eligible to serve under the law.

In his notebook Mr. Reid has a copy of a notice, which he saw outside a store: "For sale—A good cat will be sold by auction to-night." Mr. Reid says that a cat is worth from \$20 to \$25 in Dawson. People have to keep on hand large stores of food, and of these large amounts are destroyed by mice, which infest the place, and cats are therefore much in demand. 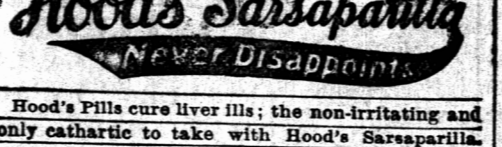
