**ISLANDER DEAD.**—The death took place in Winnipeg General Hospital on April 14th, 1919 of Jean Hasted, aged 32 years, wife of Mr. J. Henderson Lawson, Station Agent, Girou, Man., formerly of Hunter River, P. E. I. Besides the sorrowing husband, there are left four children, to mourn the loss of a devoted wife and mother.

**STORE COMPLETED.**—The firm of McDougall & McAulay, who had the contract for the carpenter work on Reddin Bros. new drugstore put the finishing touches on Saturday. The store presented a beautiful appearance Saturday evening. St. Dunstan's orchestra supplied a pleasing programme of music.

**COMING LAST OF MAY.**—In a letter received from a soldier in the 25th Nova Scotia battalion, he stated they had arrived at Witley Camp from Germany to be home the last week in May. The 25th battalion is in the same brigade as the 26th New Brunswick regiment, and it is expected they will sail about the same time.—Halifax Chronicle.

**THE STORM SEWERS.**—Work on the construction of storm sewers in Charlottetown has commenced at the foot of Pownal Street and is under the direction of the City Engineer, Mr. John P. Nicholson. An outlet is being made into the dock on the west side of Pownal wharf and similar outlets will be constructed at the foot of other streets over to Weymouth before the work further west is carried on.

**PAINFUL ACCIDENT.**—Mrs. James Champion Jr., Darnley, met with a very painful and distressing accident last week says the Pioneer. She was helping her husband to carry wood while he was splitting blocks, and reaching out her right hand for a block, the axe in some way took her across the fingers two of the fingers were taken off and a third one almost severed. Much sympathy is felt for Mrs. Champion, who was only recently married. She is very weak from pain and shock, but is doing as well as can be expected.

**REVENUE CASE.**—An adjourned case brought on by the Dept. of Inland Revenue, was concluded on Wednesday at the Summerside Police Court. The Chief witness for the prosecution was Mr. Hubley, an Inland Revenue Officer at Halifax, who in January last called at a dealer's store in town and purchased a 25 cent can of talc powder which lacked the necessary Revenue Stamp. A conviction was obtained and the defendant fined \$50 and costs.—H.

**SOLDIERS RETURN.**—A number of overseas men arrived in Charlottetown last evening. Among the number were Pte. James Vaughan of Charlottetown and Pte. W. M. McKay, of Stanley Bridge.

**TRAIN ACCIDENT.**—There was no train from Borden to the city yesterday morning owing to an accident, a freight car having become derailed at Carleton. A wrecking train went out from the city to adjust matters.

**BOAT BUILDER DEAD.**—The death of Mr. James Giffin, recorded yesterday removes a well-known citizen. Mr. Giffin was a carpenter and boat builder. A few years ago he built the yachts Freda and Dreadnought, which took first place in the regattas in this harbor. There are left to cherish his memory, the following sisters: Mrs. George Prowse; Mrs. John Corrigan; Mrs. William Flynn, and Mary, all of this city.

**NEW MANAGER OF FALCONWOOD FARM.**—Lieut. D. A. MacDonald, Wheatley River, has been appointed manager, and has assumed duty, at Falconwood Farm in succession to Mr. L. L. Jenkins, resigned. Mr. MacDonald has been driver in France having crossed first as a gunner with the first battery leaving here, and again as Lieutenant in charge of the 28th Railway Construction Draft.

**INLAND REVENUE CASES.**—Four local druggists and two stationers were tried before Stipendiary Magistrate Martin yesterday afternoon for non-compliance with the law which requires that inland revenue stamps shall be affixed to certain articles sold. Each was fined \$50, and costs this being the minimum fine in such a case. Mr. Hubley of Halifax was the prosecutor. Mr. J. J. Johnston appeared for the prosecution.

**GONE TO HALIFAX.**—Pte. Geo. W. Walker, son of the late (Capt.) D. Walker left for Halifax yesterday after spending fourteen days at his home in this city. He expects to undergo another operation on his right hand. Pte. Walker has two more brothers still in the army, one in the 2nd Heavy Battery in France and the other in the convalescent Home here. George is the youngest of the three and has served with the Fighting 26th Battalion.

**FROM OVERSEAS.**—Among Charlottetown soldiers who recently returned from overseas was Pte. William H. McKenzie, son of Mrs. Annie McKenzie, 47 Elm Ave. He went overseas with the original 105th and later transferred to the 4th Machine Gun Battalion. He put in nine months serving in France and participated in all the principal fighting from the time he went over. He escaped injury until the day the victorious Canadians entered Mons, when he was gassed. He was in hospital in England for about three months as the result of this. He is very glad to be home once more.

**LAI TO REST.**—Citizens of every station in life turned out in large numbers Sunday to pay their last tribute of respect to the memory of the late Mr. Andrew McNair. It was one of the largest funerals seen here for some time. Deceased was connected with a number of the fraternal organizations of the city and the members of three of these—the Odd Fellows, the Knights of Pythias, and the Caledonian Club attended in large numbers in regalia. The services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. R. G. Fulton and Rev. O. H. Peters. Interment was made at the Peoples' Cemetery. The pall-bearers were Messrs Jas. Paton, M. L. A., F. R. Heartz, John McLaren, D. A. McKinnon, L. E. Prowse and Daniel Morrison.

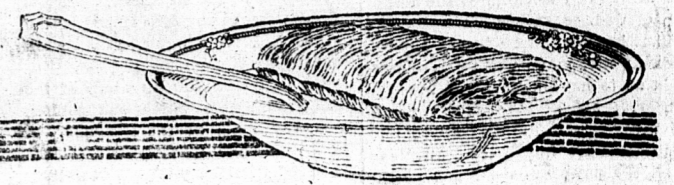
#### WEDNESDAY
