In all classes 5 to enter and three to start. Classes not filling may be declared off. Right reserved to change order of program, decline any entry, bar any driver, or declare off and fill without re-advertising, any races not satisfactorily filled.

Races start at 2 p. m. old time.

Usual allowance, 3 second, for Trotters in mixed classes

Political Meeting Held at Pownal

ber who did not realize that an election was on. This in itself was an indication that there was nothing very seriously wrong, and no great grievance of any kind.

The Patriot newspaper had complained, of course, a great deal about the roads. The roads as far as he could remember had never been the best in Spring, but this year they had been decidedly better. The school districts, he pointed out had charge of the roads, and if they were not good it was their own fault. When the people realize that they are working for their own benefit good roads will be assured.

Mr. Martin also dealt with the charge laid by the Liberals that the Conservative Government has been an extravagant one. He compared the record of the present Government, which has successfully carried on the business of the province without adding a dollar to the debt, to the record of the late Liberal administration with its great deficits piling up year after year. If it is extravagance to make ends meet, then, said Mr. Martin, this government has been guilty of that. Mr. Martin also dealt with the conditions brought on by the war, pointing out the fact that though everything had increased in value, our revenue had remained the same, and the Government had come through the period most creditably.

He referred to the great boon established by getting the ferry and the wide gauge which makes this Island practically a portion of the mainland, and said that even on that matter alone the Conservative Government should be supported.

He referred to the great benefit which has accrued to the farmers through the inauguration of the egg circles by this Government; the mud digging plant at St. Peters, where a \$20,000 plant is in operation; all of which has been to the benefit of the farmers. He referred also to the increased salaries to the teachers; the School Supply, whereby school books can be got for less than cost, and which Mr. Bell wished to do away with altogether and place in the hands of merchants to charge the people whatever they pleased. thing omitted was an explanation of where the funds would come from to bring this about and why the Liberals had neglected to do something along these lines when they had long years of opportunity to do it.

Mr. Shaw McMillan, conservative Councillor candidate was next called and for a young man who had never spoken to any extent in public before proved a wonderfully gifted speaker. He had the real touch of oratory and the confidence which comes of knowing that he had facts to back up his statements. This he said was the first time he had an opportunity to ask for the confidence of his many friends and he believed they would stand by him. He referred to the great fault finding weakness of the Liberal speakers pointing out the vast difference there is between small fault finding and real criticism. This was shown in the address of the previous speaker who had not one ounce of credit to give to the Government for anything they had ever done. All governments he believed had made mistakes and he believed it was quite possible that the present Government might have made some. But taken all around their record was far in advance of the previous Liberal administration. The farmers at present are more prosperous than ever before and he believed that that Government was entitled to some credit for this. He could not believe that the people of the Belfast district would turn out a Government which had done so much for them—and put in a party which refused to accept any responsibility in the great conflict now happily ended. With the Union Government in power at Ottawa made up of members who had left party behind for the great cause of the nation and, a Liberal Government in power here out of sympathy with that Government what could be expected. Mr. McMillan took exception to the statement that the roads are in such a terrible state as depicted by the last speaker though admitting that in the spring they are not what all would wish them to be. There was a difference though from the state of affairs which existed when a former commissioner of Public Works used to spend 78 per cent of the money in his own district and Belfast and other districts were neglected. Under the present system there is an equal distribution of the funds at least. Mr. McMillan also dealt effectively and eloquently with the question of the returned soldiers, the automobile question and taxation. Showing the emptiness of Mr. Irving's line of reasoning, especially in the case put forth by him that the Province can be run without taxes. He referred to the sorry mess of the finances of this Province under Liberal rule declaring it was a good thing for this Province when the former Premier got hold of the reins of power as it was about to sink in the whirlpool of debt and was saved just in time. He pointed out the ridiculousness of the idea that anyone can live on the same wages as years ago and the claim of the Liberals that the Government should carry on its affairs on the same financial cost as in the days before the cost of things everywhere had advanced.

Mr. McMillan closed with an eloquent preoration and clinched his argument so ably that even his opponents felt obliged to applaud him.

Mr. F. J. Nash, the Liberal Councillor candidate followed with a characteristic oration. He eloquently took Mr. Martin, the conservative candidate to task for referring to his previous defeats and then started to assail the Government under the four


