STARTLING LOSS TO CANADA BY FIRES

TORONTO, May 2.—Canada's total loss by fire since confederation is \$500,000,000, according to evidence given before Mr. Justice Master's commission enquiring into fire losses and insurance conditions at today's sittings, by J. Grove Smith, of the dominion commission for conservation.

FOOD REGULATIONS AT PICNICS, ETC.

The Canada Food Board is receiving a great number of enquiries relative to the food regulations applying to picnics, garden parties, lawn socials, etc. Special permits to serve food contrary to the regulations are being asked for, but such permits will not be given.

Observance of the food regulations at private and public functions generally has a value infinitely greater than the worth of the food saved, Mr. Thomson added, "waste is indefensible not only because of the loss of food directly involved; the weakening of the good intentions of persons who see such waste is a much more serious defect of the matter. Surely if we must not waste food when we work, we must also conserve every ounce when we play."

"I have confidence that the people are ready cheerfully to observe such restrictions as are deemed necessary. They will add to the pleasure of every holiday and like function by planning themselves, and helping others, to make all meals and refreshments models in the way of substitution and conservation. Thus, the commission enquiring into fire losses and insurance conditions in this country we still have a little time to play; while we play let us help the cause by playing the game of food conservation like true sports. Every picnic and every public or private function where food is served should be strictly a substitution meal until the war is won."

SEIZURE IN IRELAND

DUBLIN, June 24.—The police today seized 40,000 rounds of ammunition found in a consignment of grain in the Smithfield Market.

It is believed the consignment formed a part of a cargo of arms and ammunition landed on the northern coast some time ago.

AUSTRIA'S STATE IS EXAGGERATED

LONDON, June 27.—The Austrian economic situation is not so bad as the enemy would have us believe, was the gist of Lord Roert Cecil's conversation with the correspondent today. "Undoubtedly there is a great deal of agitation and considerable unrest in Austria at present, though I personally am inclined to believe it is greatly exaggerated. It had been obvious that the Germans and Austrians have made a habit always of advertising the fact when the economic conditions in their respective countries have been bad, their idea evidently being to lull the allies to sleep. Thus they thought they would take us unprepared, and to a certain degree this was not without its effect. In Britain in the time of the last campaign of this nature there was more pacifist talk than ever before. The condition in Austria may be bad, and we have good reason to know it is bad, but the mere fact that their newspapers, which are much more under control than ours, give it such publicity, and the fact also that matters of such a nature could only be published with the full consent of the Government, gives me very strong reason to doubt their veracity. The peace offensive hasn't made any great advance yet, as the enemy is still devoting all attention to the battles. The Imperial Conference being held in London is the most valuable from many British viewpoints, and also from an allied viewpoint. Nothing exceeded the ardor and determination to continue the war of the colonies represented by their statements. Such conference will be all to the common good later. They will also discuss the economic conditions. It is very essential that we should all discuss that and if we are ever to need anything by the league of nations it must be based upon the economic pressure."

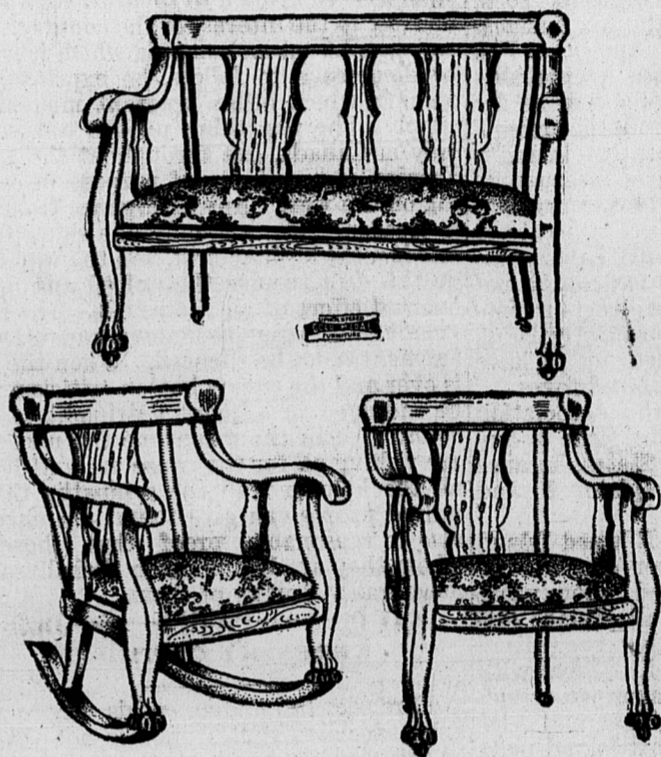

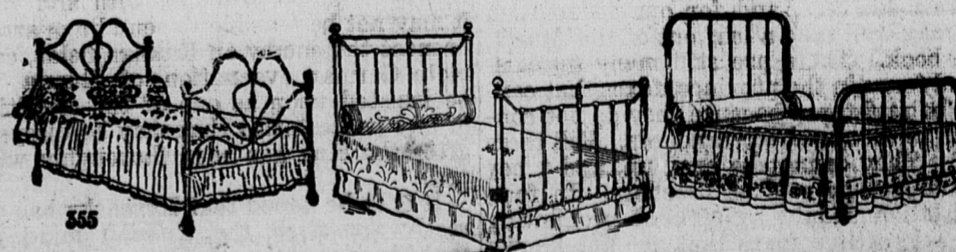
