Crop Reports

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with Crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

GENERAL

Hot dry winds have adversely affected crops in Central and Southeastern Alberta and Northern and Central Saskatchewan. In the rest of these two Provinces conditions generally are fair and in Manitoba favourable. In Ontario, Quebec, and Maritime Provinces reports indicate satisfactory crops. In British Columbia the apple crop will be less than last year. Details follow:—

PRAIRIE PROVINCES

EDMONTON DISTRICT—Conditions fair in vicinity Edmonton, Vegreville, Red Deer, and from Camrose to Sedgewick where frost fell night of 14th July. There was also much needed precipitation in Lacombe District. **CALGARY DISTRICT**—From Carleton North and East of Saskatchewan boundary conditions are very unfavourable, grain short, burning and heading. From Olds south conditions fair to good. **LETHBRIDGE DISTRICT**—North and East of Lethbridge crops are very poor especially at Medicine Hat. South and West of Lethbridge conditions continue favourable. **SASKATOON DISTRICT**—Owing to warm dry weather, broken only by local showers, crop conditions unfavourable. Grain is short and wheat is heading prematurely. Yield will be light and there is likely to be a shortage of feed and seed in some districts. Pastures and hay crop poor. Recent showers have improved situation in some localities but Creek and prairie districts crop conditions fairly satisfactory, with indications for good yield in Southern Sections. **WINNIPEG DISTRICT**—Wheat crop though late is in satisfactory condition and only needs showers to carry to maturity in good average shape. There are the usual disappointing exceptions, 50% in head. General conditions are favourable.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

The outlook generally is encouraging and points to a good average crop but notwithstanding recent rains, which have been beneficial, more moisture is needed in some sections. Grain continues to do well. Hay yields good in lowlands and fair on higher ground. Roots are making good progress and yield promises to be satisfactory. Pastures are improving.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Weather conditions have been favourable through the past week and crops in general show improvement. Fall wheat is filling well and ripening fast. Prospects are for a better than average crop. Barley, oats and peas promise average yield, although straw will be short. Corn is late but looks well. Alfalfa and clover are heavy. Timothy only fair. The root crop

Germany Shunned By Tourists

BERLIN, July 21.—Germany is experiencing the worst tourist season since the war.

Shipping men and hoteliers are shedding bitter tears of disappointment that American and other guests are remaining away from this country this summer, while England and France are reported reaping a greenback harvest. Propaganda and advertising abroad are having no effect. More powerful than the pleas of the German hotel men is the alleged French and English propaganda against the German resorts. Still more powerful is the fact that German prices are way beyond French and English, while the attractions Germany offers the visitors are not especially alluring.

Hotel prices that compare favorably—or unfavorably—with New York's; theatre prices ranging around \$5 per seat and often more; taxes on hotel guests; recollection of unfavorable treatment of visitors the past two years—these are factors operating to the disadvantage of the German tourist business.

Ill-treatment and gouging, so prevalent during the inflation period, have mostly disappeared. Every effort is now made to make the visitor's stay in Germany pleasant, for hotelmen and storekeepers have come to a belated realization that impoliteness does not lure, and the gouging is something a tourist resents, be it little or great.

The hotel proprietors' association is continuing its fight for abolition of hotel taxes. In Berlin, the city council has seen their point of view to the extent of lowering the tax to 15 percent, but so far steadfastly refuses to harken to the argument that a total abolition would be a drawing card, more profitable to business than the tax receipts.

I. L. B. Takes Rapid Strides

(United Press.)

GENEVA, July 21.—The rapid progress that is being made all over the world in the matter of labor legislation has been summarized in a statement issued by the International Labor Bureau.

Since the creation of the International Labor Bureau under the terms of the Versailles treaty, the various international labor conferences that have since been held, including the original one at Washington in 1919, that of Geneva in 1920 and the three successive ones at Geneva in 1921, 1922, and 1923, have drafted thirty-six international conventions and recommendations relating to the adjustment of labor conditions.

To date these thirty-six conventions, of which the most important one is that of the eight-hour day, have received a total of 133 ratifications in the various countries. There is no virtually no country in the world, belonging to the International Labor Bureau, that has not ratified and put into force from one to half a dozen of these international labor conventions.

Considers Unemployment.

The International Labor Bureau by a series of investigations in the leading countries of the world has demonstrated that the financial policy of a government is one of the

greatest factors in the question of unemployment. The general principle that has been deduced from the investigation is that countries that have inflated their currencies suffer less from unemployment than those which seek to bring their currency back to the pre-war basis.

The most striking example of this is declared to be England where the government's effort to re-establish the pre-war value of the pound, necessitating a deflation of currency has resulted in industrial conditions that have left a million people out of employment.

The same phenomenon was noticed in Poland where the efforts of the government to rehabilitate the national finances resulted in unemployment which attained in some industries as high as 40 percent of all the workers. Czechoslovakia also passed through a similar experience when the government undertook to deflate the currency but since then the industrial situation, including the element of unemployment has adapted itself to the new basis of a stabilized currency.
