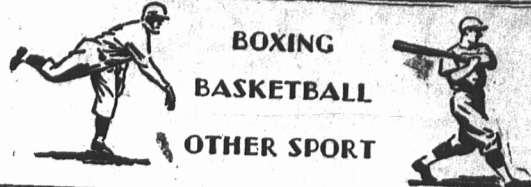

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Had a letter from Dannie Steele, formerly of Summerside, a few days ago. He is located at Aliston, Mass race track where he has a head of trotters and pacers. Some of the trotters have been in 2:20 and Dan looks forward to a good season. It is the best stable he has had for years. Although fame has been away for the past fifteen years or more he is not forgotten, and many old timers will remember the great campaign he made with Ada Mac, 2:17 when but a boy.

Alexis 2:17 Futurity S. A. Rockford's former pupil, was purchased by parties in Summerside and placed in his hands for training this season. The Professor seems to have the key to this mare as others who have handled her did not have his success.

Water Cox believes that the backward weather have been having will make better horses for the season's racing. Had the weather been fine and warm he thinks the trainers would naturally force them to race and probably take too much out of them before they were really ready for the rail.

A silver tube has been inserted in the throat of Real Money, three-year-old brother to Cold Cash 1:58 1-2. The horse took some form of distemper and the breathing apparatus never completely recovered. This operation was tried out on Captain Jackson 2:15 1-2 when owned by our friend Charles Chandler. He raced real well afterwards. Of course a trotter or pacer has to get a great deal of air into his lungs when going at top speed and if there is any obstruction it slows them up.

John Judy 2:01 was a very successful pacer for many years until last season when in the fast class to which he was eligible he did not race so well. This season he has been turned over to the trot and has been in 2:21, but as he is a national sort of horse his trainer is not convinced that even if he shows miles many seconds better than that, that he will be a reliable racing proposition. He may think "trot" when he should be thinking "trot."

Our friend Frank P. Kenney of the American Trotting Association, has been commissioned a "Colonel" by Governor Chandler of Kentucky, for outstanding work done in the field of the horse. Frank's statistical ability is largely employed in the preparation of the Year Book and other harness horse matter.

Mrs. E. Roland Harriman, who can drive a trotter or pacer as well as any man, skipped the two-year-old Leading Lady a final quarter of a 2:2 1-2 mile in 33 1-2 seconds at Goshen, N. Y. last week.

"The track is full of horses" is an expression used about the Charlottetown Driving Park these days, upwards of twenty or thirty candidates for this season are receiving their preparatory work but no miles better than 2:40 have yet been driven. The course is in excellent shape.

Peter Hal 2:05 3-4, the fast class pacer imported to Cape Breton a couple of months ago, is in the ownership of Frank S. Holmes, Glace Bay, N. S., and was purchased from Charles S. Middagh, Lewiston, Pa.

Jose the Great 2:06, holder of the Maritime record for pacing mares or mares of any gait, better the Maritimes, is being offered for sale by L. S. Bickerton of Amherst, N. S., in an ad which appeared in a recent issue of the Canadian Sportsman. She is eligible to the 2:14 pace and we know of very few, if any, that can beat her in that class.

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, May 19.—Without their usual waste of power, New York Yankees exploded three runs in the eighth inning today to halt Chicago White Sox 4-2 and mark up their ninth consecutive American League baseball victory.

Charley (The Red) Ruffing spread seven hits over the route without a defeat. He kept out of the sixth when pitcher Gerald Walker tripled to left and came home on Rip Radcliff's single, and in the ninth when catcher Ken Silverski homered into the centerfield bleachers.

Lefty Ed Smith suppressed the champions on three hits for seven innings, but they bunched three more in the eighth and Chit Brown had to be called in to finish.

The Red Sox pounded four pitchers for 18 hits, including Jim Tabors' first homer of the season, while subjecting St. Louis Browns to their sixth straight defeat, 15-7.

Acadia Track And Field Squad Sweeps To Victory In Intercollegiate Meet

(By Gayle Talbot, Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, May 19.—Bobby Riggs, who represents what is known as the United States has kept the Davis Cup from going to Australia in September, is preparing to sail for England and the famous finishing school of tennis, Wimbledon.

For Schooling

He is being sent by the United States Davis Cup Committee, along with Elwood Cooke, to play in the All-England championships for the first time. The two other outstanding candidates for the defending American cup team—Wayne Sabin and Gene Mako—are being kept on this side to play the regular eastern tournament circuit.

Makes 'em Like It

This is a great personal triumph for Riggs over the rulers of United States tennis destinies. Bobby Riggs has been unpopular with the Brass Hats from the first year he came east. He was hard bitten and outspoken and never made the slightest effort to smooth the ruffled feeling of the great White Chiefs.

As a result, while the more favored and amenable tennis sons lawn parties each summer, Bobby was left home to follow the bread-and-butter trail. He had to become the country's first ranking amateur and his Davis Cup ace before they bought him a boat ticket.

Or Else

Down in Miami the past winter he made it clear to me he was going to play at Wimbledon this summer—or else. He said he thought himself unprepared for the American Davis Cup team against the expected assault from Australia was to send the players to Wimbledon. He seems to have made it stick.

Auto Classic Slated Today

INDIANAPOLIS, May 19.—Speed probably record-breaking speed for the Indianapolis motor race—will be the order of the day as the 2 1-2-mile brick and asphalt oval tomorrow as a score or more of ace United States drivers quest race cars on 10-mile tests in the 500-mile Memorial Day classic.

Drivers put finishing touches today on their machines, some brand new creations and others not so new. A check showed between 20 and 25 hoped to be ready for tomorrow's runs.

Only 33 cars can start the race May 30 and if more than that number qualify tomorrow and on succeeding days, the slower machines will be eliminated.

The best bet seemed to be that a speed of around 130 miles an hour would be required to win the pole position in the front row. A lively fight for that spot appeared likely, seven drivers already having announced their intention of "chooting for the pole." Others may have enough "under the hood" or are going to be content with something around 125 to 127 miles an hour.

Lombardi's Homer Gives Reds 4-3 Win Over Phils In 12-inning Contest

(By The Associated Press) CINCINNATI, May 19.—Ernie Lombardi ended a 12-inning ball game today with his fifth home run of the year, giving Cincinnati a 4-3 victory over Philadelphia and a virtual tie with St. Louis at the top of the National Baseball League pennant heap.

Even six errors, three to a side, failed to dampen the heat of a pitchers' battle between Max Butcher and big Paul Derringer before a crowd of 3,187.

Boston Bees, sparked in three innings by double driving by Buddy Huggins, defeated Pittsburgh Pirates 5-2 to snap a losing streak.

The Bees added two more runs in the second, routing Rip Sewell, Relief hurler Bill Swift held the Bees to two hits in the remainder of the game.

Lou Pette started for Boston but left in the third with a sore arm after the Pirates put together two hits and a base on balls for their three runs.

Scoring their biggest scoring spree of the season, New York Giants rampaged past Chicago Cubs 11-5 for right-hander Harry Gumbert's fourth victory against one defeat.

They drove rookie Gene Lillard from the mound in a five-run second inning and continued the assault against Charley Root and Jack Russell for a total of 11 hits, but the Cubs contributed three errors all of which helped in New York's scoring.

In the big second inning Hank Leiber dropped a fly ball to let in one run, two were forced in by two hits and two more came home on Hank Demming's single with the bases loaded.

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Reich Tennis Team Leads Over Poland

WARSAW, Poland, May 19.—Germany's Davis Cup team took a lead over Poland in the opening zone match today, played before a crowd that showed, on the whole, good sportsmanship despite the tense feeling between the two countries.

Roderick Menzel, who formerly played under Czechoslovak colors, won 7-5, 7-3, 2-6, 2-6, 6-4, over the Polish ace, Adam Bawotowski, who once played for Austria although a Pole by birth. The second match was called because of darkness with Egnacy Tycinski, leading Germany's Heinrich Henkel, 6-4, 68-64.

The chief dramatics came from 500 bleacher fans. Although cried down by grandstand spectators, the bleacherites let their feelings get the better of them at times, to the extent of jeers, personal jibes and applause when the Germans missed a shot.

ELIMINATE CHINA

PARIS, May 19.—The French Davis Cup team eliminated China from the European zone competition today when the doubles combination of Yvon Petra and Pierre Pelizza defeated Kho Kie and J. H. Ho, 6-2, 6-0, 6-3.

The victory followed two triumphs in the singles yesterday and sent France into semi-final round of the zone against England next week.

Form Bowling Federation

HALIFAX, May 19.—(CP)—A Maritime-Eastern Maine bowling federation henceforth will regulate all bowling tournaments, it was decided tonight at a meeting of competitors in the tournament which ended early today.

The Federation will pass on entries for championship tournaments, bowling alley equipment including size of pins, alleys, gutters, balls and incidental fixtures and will seek affiliation with the American Bowling Congress.
