GERMANY RETAINS A LAWYER FOR DEFENCE.

COPENHAGEN, via London, April 15.—The German Government has retained Martin Waldenström, a Swedish lawyer, of Malmo, to go to the United States and act as counsel for the defence in a lawsuit connected with the German auxiliary cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich, which is now interned at the Norfolk navy yard. Mr. Waldenström will leave for the United States this week.

Nothing known in Washington or New York of any suit having been filed against the auxiliary cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich, which put into Newport News some time ago after a commerce destroying raid extending from the former German base at Tsing-Tau, China, across the Pacific into the Atlantic, and up to Newport News.

GERMANS VIOLATE HAGUE CONVENTION.

PARIS, April 15.—A communication given out today by the French Ministry of Marine declares that the Germans again have violated the Hague Convention in their sea warfare.
Article I of the Eighth Hague Convention provides that torpedoes carry an automatic attachment which will cause them to sink if they do not explode and thus cease to be a menace to navigation. German torpedoes recently discovered in the English Channel, the announcement declares, although unexploded, were still floating. An examination of them showed that the submersible appliance had been tightly corked, permitting them to float on the surface of the water. This made them floating mines.

SIX MASTED SCHOONER COLLIDES WITH WARSHIP.

NEW YORK, April 16.—The six masted schooner Edward B. Winslow, one of the largest afloat, was brought into New York harbor today in the tow of a tug, her bowsprit carried away and her bow stove in. The Winslow sailed from Boston, April 9, for New York. It was reported that the schooner had been in a collision early today with a British warship off Sandy Hook.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Arrangements have been completed for the shipment to America of two cargoes of German dyestuffs which were paid for by the American importers before March 1, and are now at Rotterdam.

The attendance was the largest in the history of the Theatre, and the films are said to be the most costly that have as yet been brought to this province. No pains were spared by the producers in their efforts to surpass anything heretofore released in the film world, the smallest detail receiving as careful attention as larger and more pretentious ones. Certain members of the cast were put through a course of training for a year previous to the actual making of the picture. Europe was scouted for one character alone—Ursus, whose fidelity to Lygia, and his victorious fight with the bull Aurochs, in the amphitheatre, is truly wonderful.
